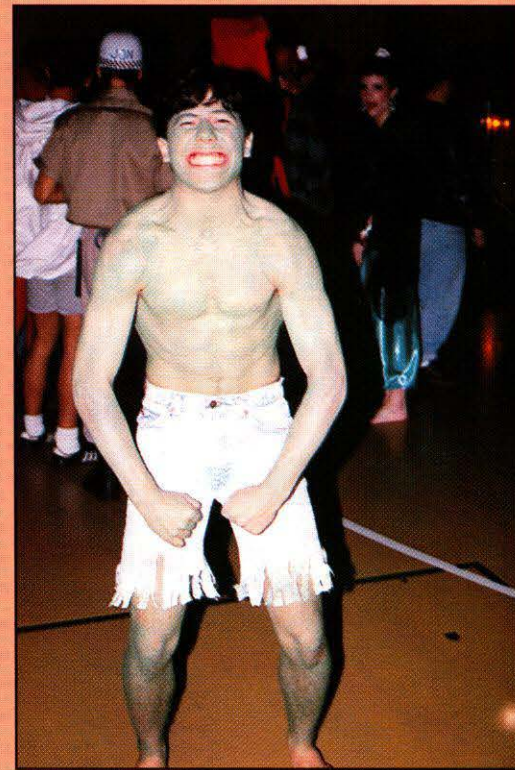
Haunting Halloween

The last song was played and the night came to a close. Ghosts, clowns, and cartoon characters dispersed into the dank, night air. It was an evening that will never be forgotten!



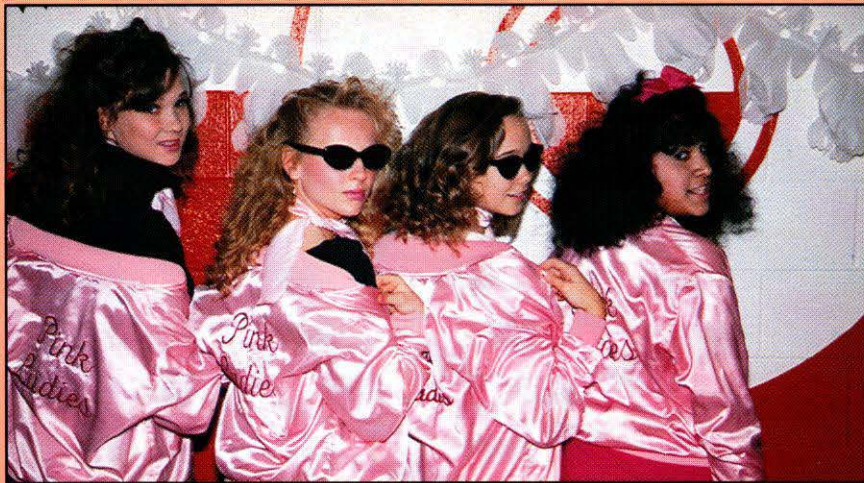

Before 7:25 A.M. and After 1:50 P.M.

There are two bells that have uniform meaning to all CHS students. The first signals the beginning of the day, with all its classes, teachers, hassles, and worries. The second, the final bell, dismisses the student body to go their separate ways. From the time of the first bell through the ringing of the final bell, everyone does the same thing: SCHOOL! Students go to class, rush to lockers, finish last minute homework and debate the possibilities of getting caught for cutting a class. During this time each student is a slave to the grind of the educational system. But before the first bell rings and after the last bell goes off, students make their own choices.

Many interests go on before 7:10 A.M., such as swim team practices. Garrett Burke, a high school senior and swimmer, wakes up before the rooster in order to practice. David Jackson, a defensive player for the CHS hockey team, also had a busy "pre-sunrise" schedule. Tryouts, held at Skate 3 in Tyngsboro, began at 5:30 A.M. and ran till 6:50 A.M. That meant waking up about 4:00 in the morning, dressing in the dark, and eating on the run. Some practices were even held on "no school" days. Because they began before school was called off, the trip to the rink was amidst the dodging of snowflakes. Black ice was a threat, because the sun had not yet risen to do its work. Dave says the good thing about early tryouts is that he was "wide awake for first period." Unfortunately, by period six, he was "ready for a nap." Sometimes he went to bed for the night by 6:30 P.M. No doubt, Dave and his fellow hockey players are a dedicated team.

After-school activities also extend the senior day. Although the dismissal bell rings at 1:50 P.M., it looks like school is still in session long after the buses roll out. That's because so many students are involved in the extra-curricular program.

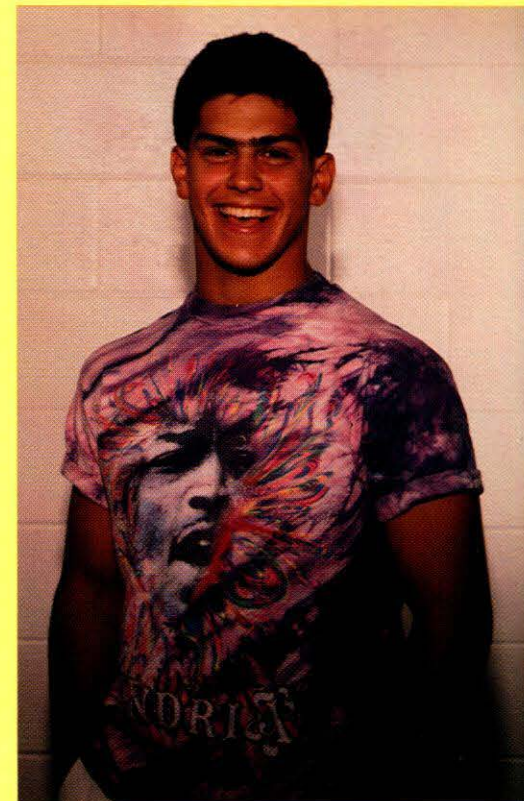
After school activities can often be

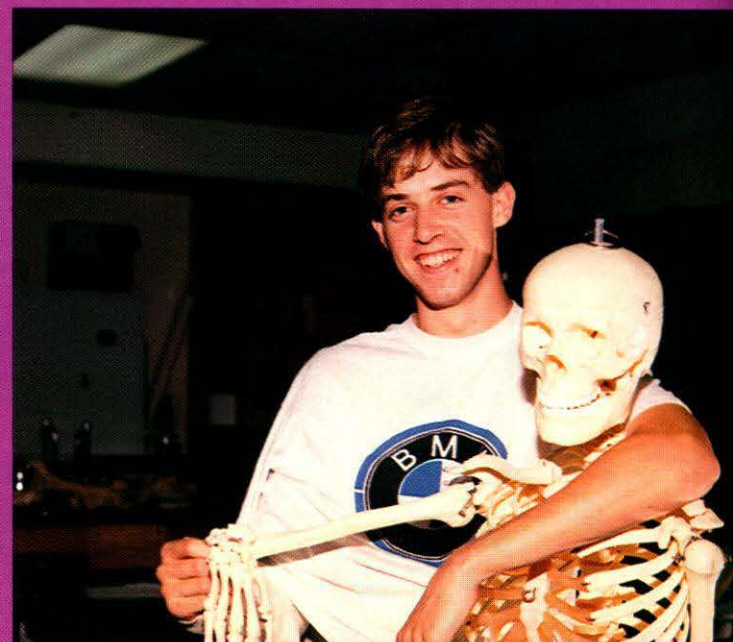
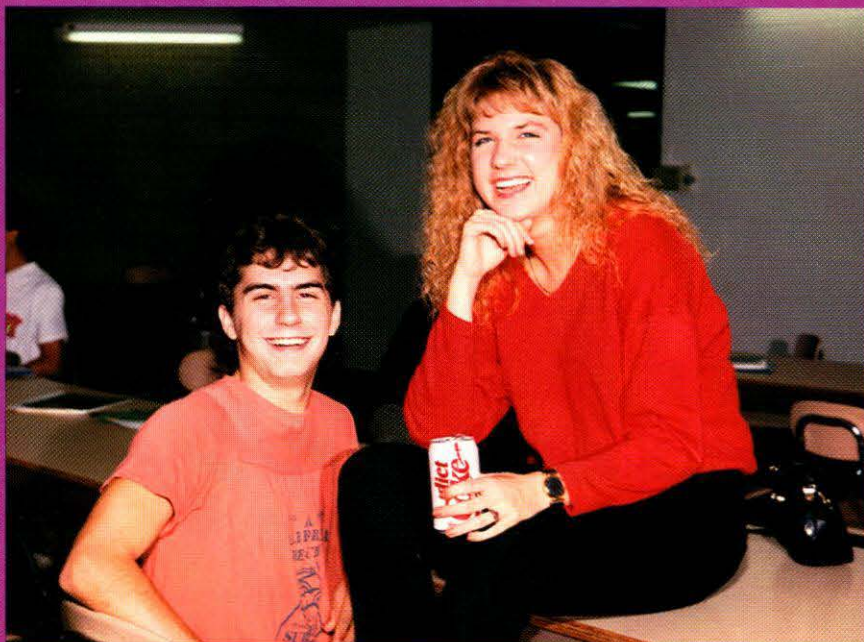
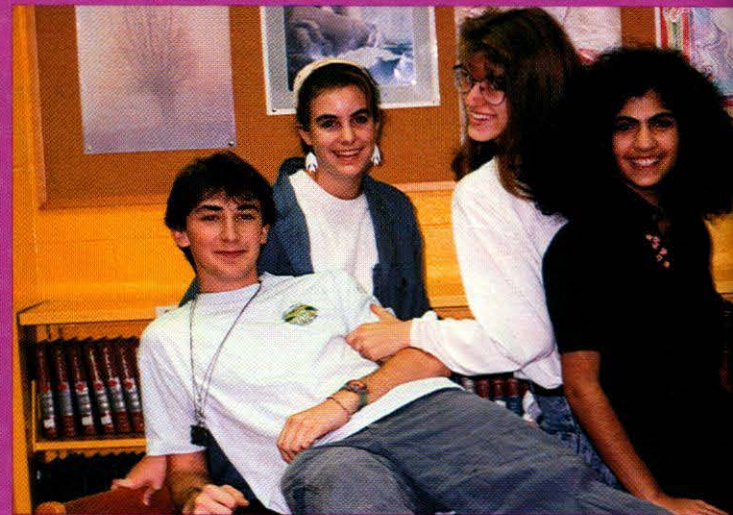
Arthur Kalos, likewise, has a demanding agenda. As class president, he spends a great deal of time taking

Not only are students up before sunrise; sometimes they don't get home until after sunset. Regardless of when the senior's day begins or ends, all agree that the days are long and hard.

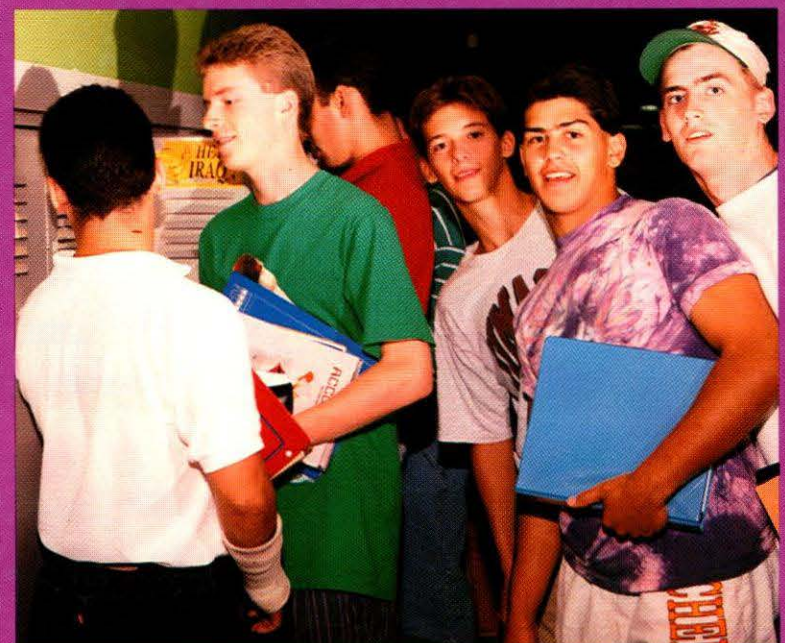
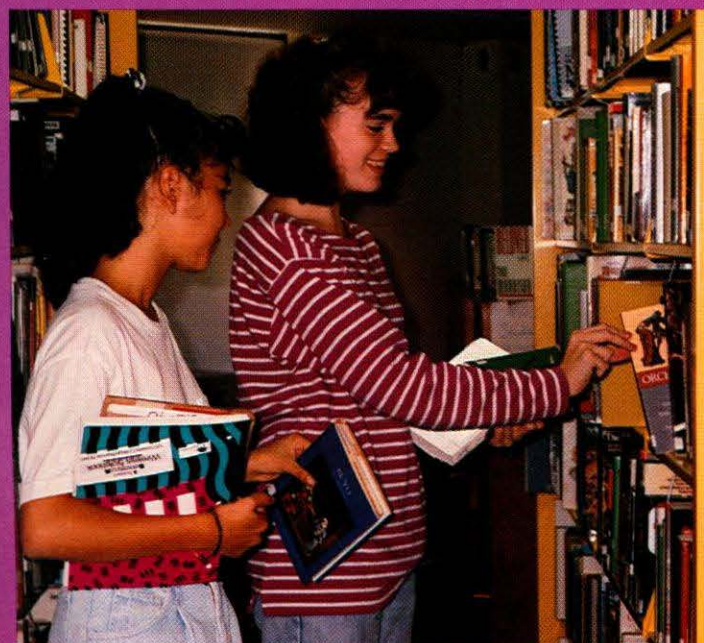
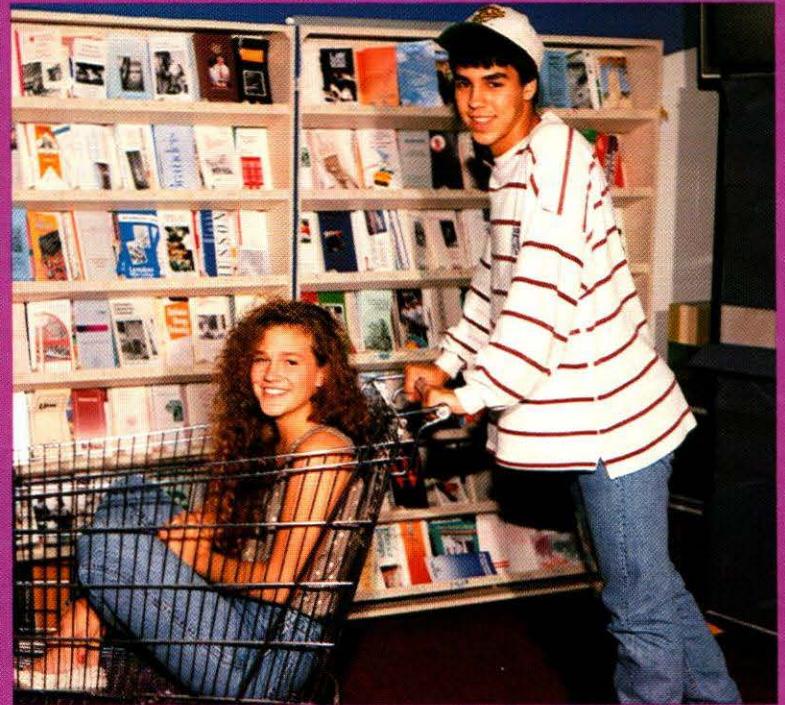

Class History

A chronicle of our educational experiences from 1979 to the present, and beyond . . .

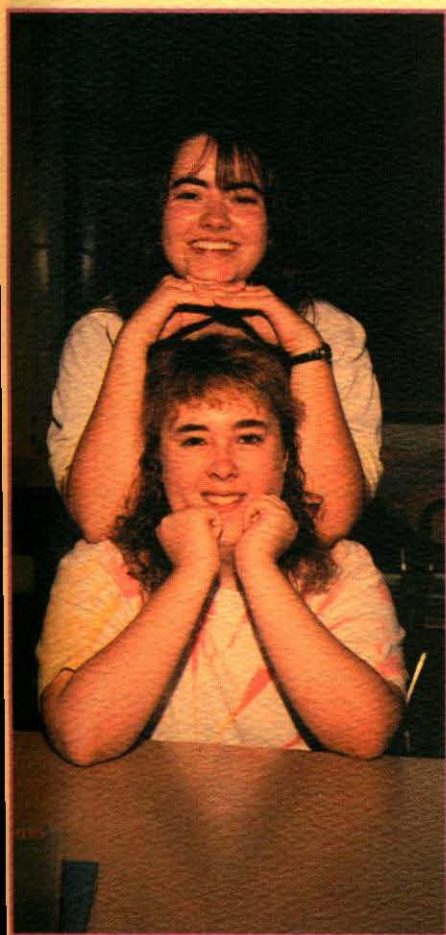

Marbles, erasers, pumpkins, and bras — the tools of the trade for the senior prankster. While they have struck with irregularity and met with varied degrees of success, they have always been around Chelmsford High ... and always will be. They're a permanent part of the senior milieu, scheming through the year, planning the final mark to leave on the school. Some believe these pranks leave nothing but a scar, but for others, occasionally at least, they can draw in a smile on the otherwise stoic face of Chelmsford High. These are the pranks of Chelmsford — daring, ingenious, and humorous; ugly, dangerous and foolish. For every prank, there was somebody who hated it and there was somebody who loved it, but everybody was always interested.

The foundation of senior pranks were laid at the old high school, now McCarthy, where streaking seemed to be the most popular means of self-expression. But this particular prank has died out, though there have been occasional reappearances of nude bodies racing through the library in recent years. This is obviously not the best prank Chelmsford has ever seen. While it does seem to provide a momentary shock, it does not exactly take ingenious planning to strip down to the "bare necessities" and sprint for all you're worth. Fortunately, Chelmsford pranksters have become a bit more creative in later years.

An early prank in the new building was the trend setter for years to come. Around 1976, some brave lad (or lady) floated a large portrait of Mr. Simonian into the science pond. Fortunately, it was not the prank itself that would be emulated by future jokesters (while I like Mr. Simonian as much as the next guy, the prank lacked a certain daring),

it was the location. The science pond is the perfect place for a prank to be exhibited; it has a gallery for spectators built in with Whittier, Hawthorne, and the dining room overlooking it. Thus it has been the canvas upon which many a rambunctious prankster has painted. Unfortunately, as with any showing, there have been bad works as well as good.

One of the most entertaining pranks occurred in what is now the Computer Graphics Room but what used to be the restricted study room. Somebody tapped into the PA system through that room and played short stints of popular music. It took quite a while for the authorities to solve that mystery; meanwhile, the hard-working student body received a few well-earned interruptions from their studies.

Another very popular prank, even with many teachers, was the big-time eraser-caper, in which all the erasers in the school were ransomed. Last year, somebody attempted a copy-cat caper involving the microphones from the mouthpieces of the telephones in the classrooms, but they failed to get all the speakers, and they failed to realize that one can speak into the earpiece if necessary. Oh, well! You can't win them all!

Of all the pranks in Chelmsford High history, the one that will probably stick most in the minds of the students of this

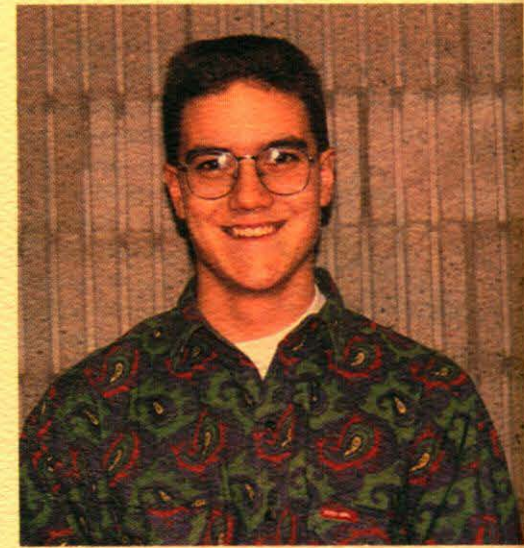
Some students said they were planning to attend medical school; others will join a band; still others will go into the armed forces. But the one thing they all have in common is that they're psyched. They're finally out of high school!

Seniors were interviewed about their post graduate plans. Responses were interesting:

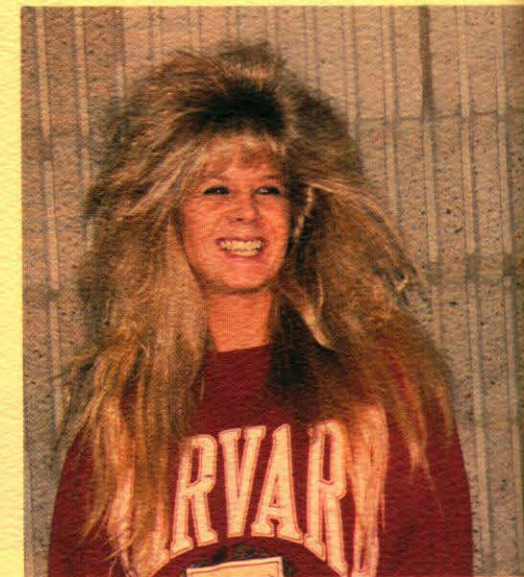

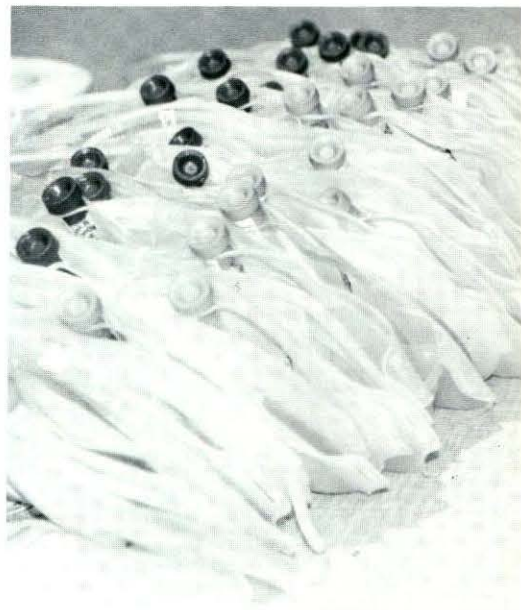

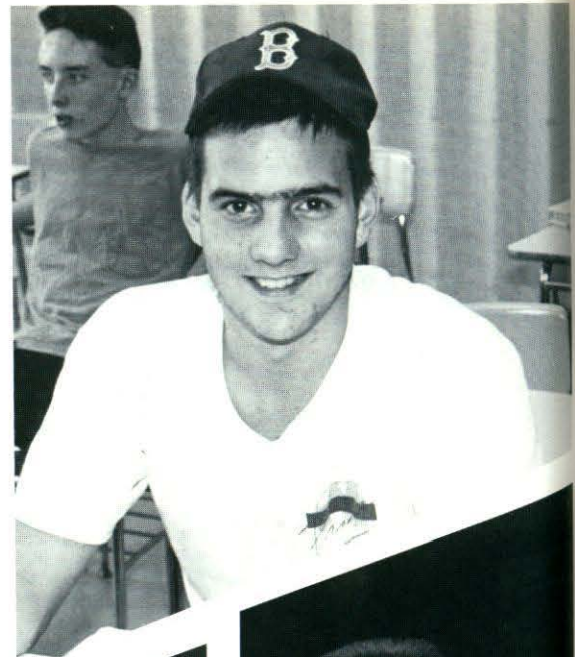
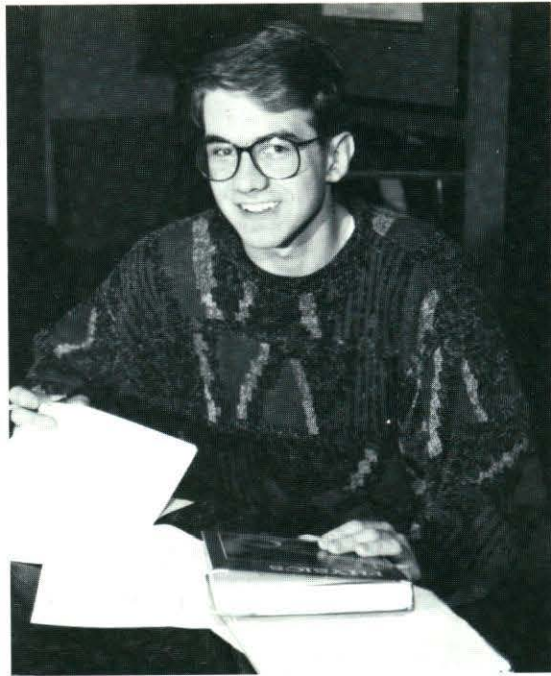


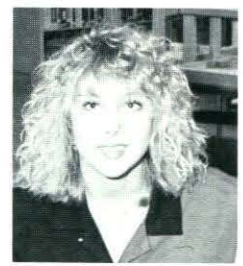
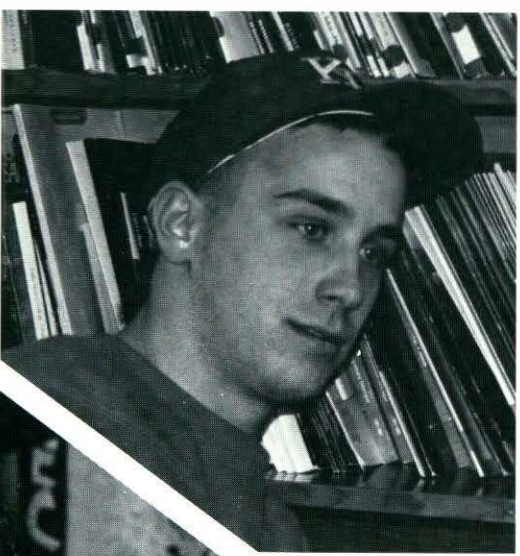
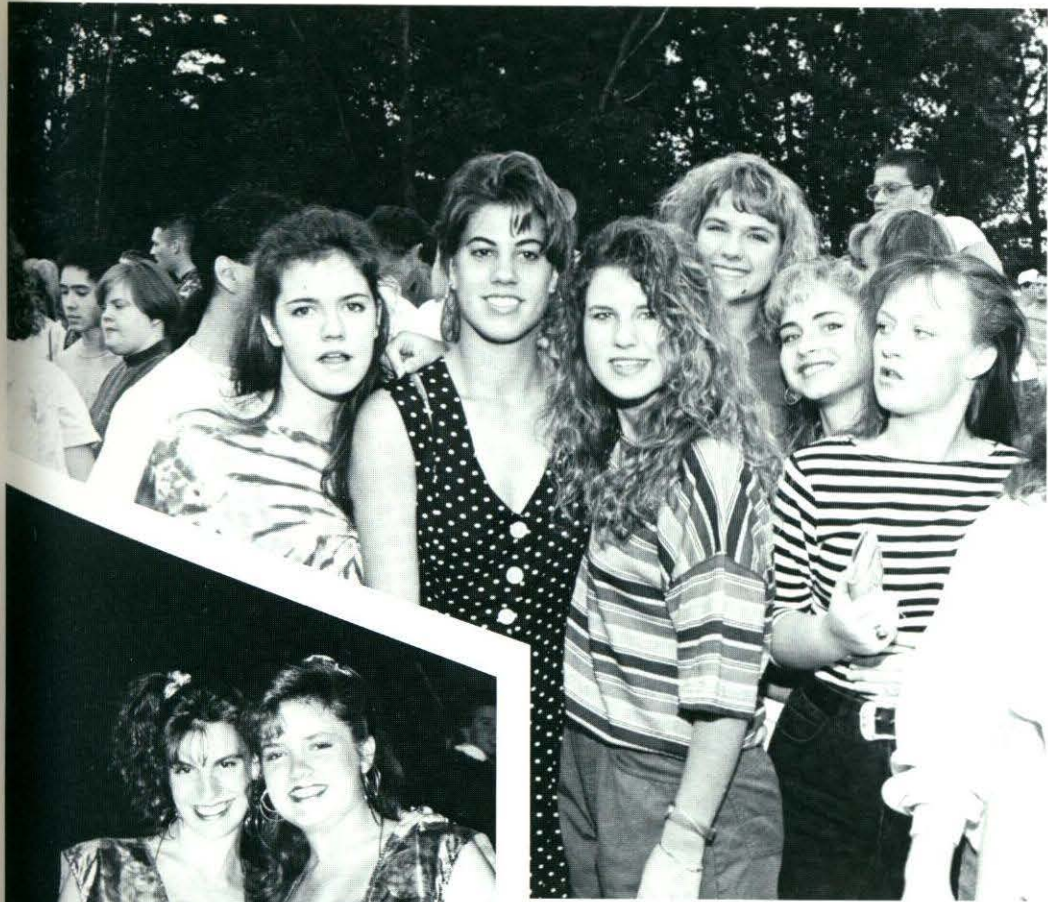
DONOR PRIDE

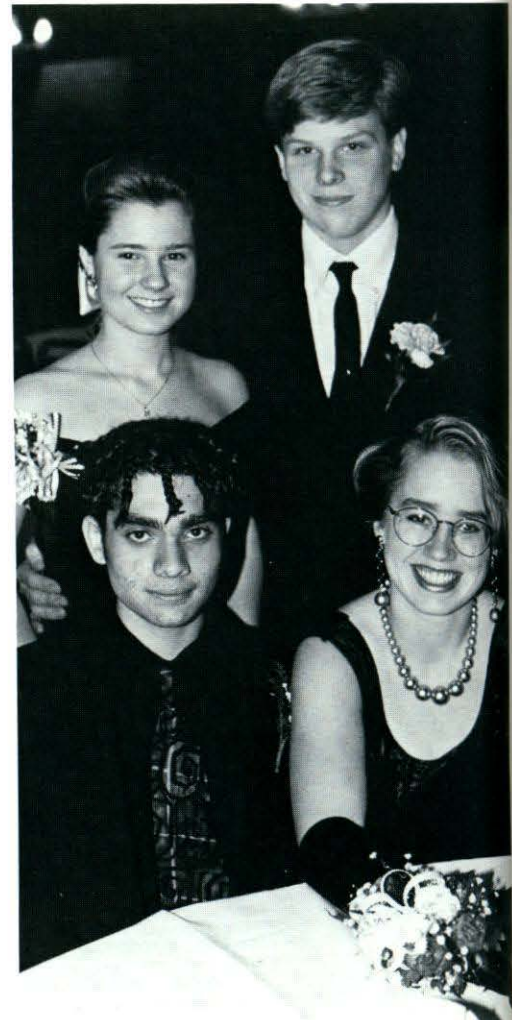

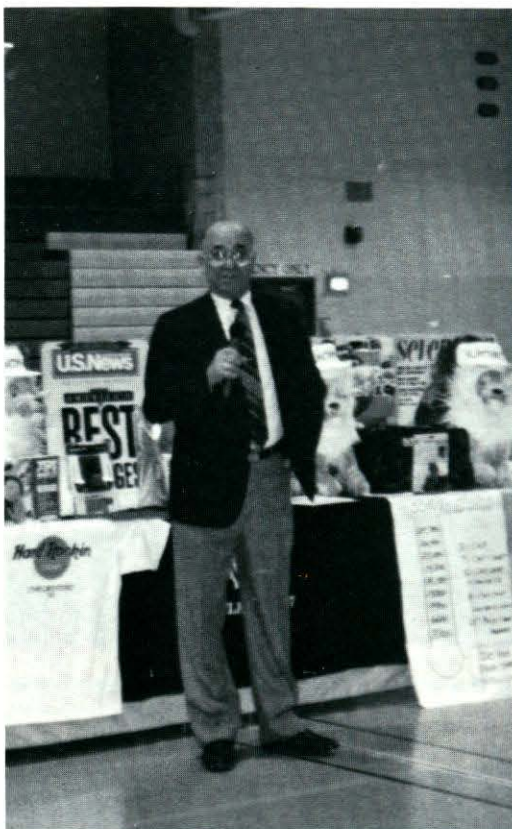

Thanks to the new P.A. system, the seniors could finally hear what Mr. Betses was saying. He challenged each senior to sell at least three subscriptions.

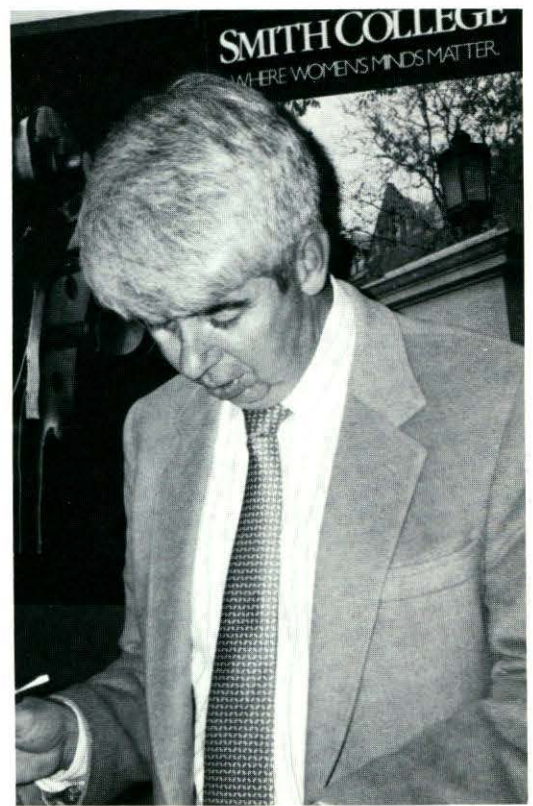

An End to the Hostage Crisis for Americans

Three Americans died in the seven year long hostage crisis. Fourteen in all were taken in this nightmare of beatings, unspeakable indignities, and amazing courage. The release of Terry Anderson in December, just one week after the release of Joseph Cicippio and Alann Steen, signified the end of the turmoil for Americans.

Two German men remain hostages, but Anderson's release was marked by a sense of relief in America. Stories of the hostage dilemma began to recirculate or be told for the first time. The many years of waiting for families, the government's refusal to negotiate, and the suffering of the hostages themselves were all recalled as the crisis finally came to an end.

Despite horrific accounts of their treatment, ex-hostages praised the American government's no-negotiation stance. "I didn't want those guys to get a nickel for me," said Tom Sutherland. In addition, ex-hostages, many with a new-found religious zeal, spoke of the need to forgive their former captives.

These men all returned to the lives they were forced to leave as many as 2,455 days (Terry Anderson) before. They will carry reminders in the form of permanent neurological damage (Alann Steen), or frost bite (Joseph Cicippio), or twenty percent hearing loss (Father Lawrence Jenco), or the emotional scars of prolonged captivity in a tiny cell. Terry Anderson and Jesse Turner returned to children that they had never seen before. Above all, the men returned as heroes, courageous and strong.

The Smith Rape Trial: News or Soap Opera?

The excessive coverage of the William Kennedy Smith rape trial was discussed in the news almost as much as the trial itself. Thus it seems only fitting that the final verdict (not guilty) seemed to be an after-thought, for the real attraction lay in the middle name of the accused and the panty-hose of the accuser.

From jokes on "Saturday Night Live" to daily updates on the networks to nearly perpetual coverage by CNN, it was impossible to escape the West Palm Beach trial. The bar-hopping preamble to the alleged rape was a

blow to the reputation of Senator Edward Kennedy while the trial itself, judging from facial expressions, seemed to be little more than a nuisance to Smith. Then there was the accuser, whose voice and sobs were heard in every living room every day, but whose face was a mystery, covered by a blue, white, or gray dot.

What was the real incentive for such intensive coverage? Was it the American outrage at the crime of rape? Or was it just a scene that fit in well between other soap operas?

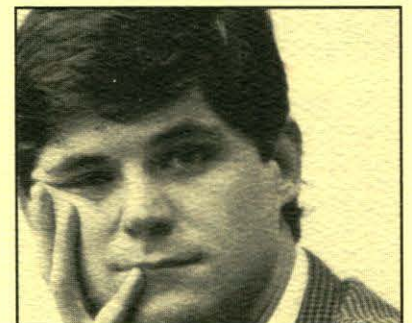
Hurricane Bob

New Englanders were ready when Hurricane Bob struck on August 19, 1991. They had followed its path as it whipped up the eastern seaboard, causing significant damage, especially in Rhode Island. But the taped windows and storm windows and all other preparations were not enough on Cape Cod, which bore the brunt of the storm. The hurricane with gusts peaking at 90 mph, ripped down trees, tore off roofs, and caused the Cape wide power outages lasting several days in most areas, longer in some.

There were a few casualties including a drowned swimmer and an injury resulting from a roof torn from a hotel. In Provincetown, one unnamed person was taken to a hospital after the roof of the Sandcastle Resort was blown off and landed on a near by cottage. Firefighters rescued several people including the injured man.

The pain of flooded basements and other property damage was eased by insurance for many homeowners. But, others, less lucky, could do nothing but wait out the storm in emergency evacuation shelters set up in schools and military bases. Tourists were also stranded due to the closing of the Bourne and Sagamore bridges.

Perhaps the greatest casualties of the storm were Cape businesses. Not only did looters take advantage of smashed windows and empty stores, but the tourist-based economy suffered great losses for the season.

Communism Crumb

As the world around us ages, natural changes and new branches of evolution arise. However, perhaps one of the largest areas of modification and development can be pin-pointed within the borders of the Soviet Union. Over the late summer months of 1991, many dramatic happenings began to reconstruct the powerful, communist region called the Soviet Union.

Reports being received daily revealed the difficulties in governing such an enormous land mass with several republics, each possessing its own desires. Chaotic occurrences commenced when a coup attempt was made upon the government of the Soviet Union. As of Tuesday, August 20, 1991, there was only one issue that remained undisputed; because of the attempted overthrow of their government, the Soviet people were faced with the stark choice of submitting to more communism or risking their lives for more democracy. Because of the influence this communist mass has upon the world, every ear remained alert for the news of any new happenings from behind the curtain of the Soviet Union.

The world was not kept waiting long, for on the 22nd of August, 1991, it was announced that "communism had finally died" and that Boris Yeltsin had now become a "true founding father for a new democratic Russia". The coup attempt, a clear failure, is now thought to have been led by an eight member gang of bureaucrats. Previously, suspicions were directed to the many hostile revolutionaries who openly voiced their cry for democracy in the open streets of downtown Moscow.

Needless to say, this final downfall of the unsuccessful communist system called for great celebration. Millions flocked to the streets and

partied throughout the night atop the many tanks that had earlier patrolled the public squares and outside governmental buildings. This truly called for rejoicing all around the world. After all, Cuba is the last of the remaining fathers of the communist system. It is hoped that the efforts of the Soviet Union, in moving toward democracy, shall draw the United States all the closer to its powerful and influential neighbor.

Further developments are still underway within the Soviet borders. At this time, citizens of the United States, as well as the rest of the world, are beginning to experience a bit of Russia's change. All travel plans to the U.S.S.R. have been downplayed. At this time of chaos and great uncertainty, the execution of any travel within this region is not advised. Until further notice, the cancellation of travel plans is a wise decision at this juncture in the radical development of a new Soviet Union.

In the most recent developments, it has been reported that the rush of independence of the Baltic Republic has been satisfied. On the 26th of August, a special meeting of the Supreme Soviet cast a decision that could result in the official independence for the Baltic republics. It has become clear in the mind of every Soviet, young and old alike, that these times will yield to the awaited social revolution. What has occurred in those few weeks is absolutely astounding. To think of the development and the downfall of such powerful systems is mind boggling. One would suspect these changes to occur over an extended period — not a few weeks!

Because of the dramatic changes that have rocked the Soviet society, many unplanned difficulties have arisen. Perhaps one of the greatest and widespread of this nation's problems is the demands upon a dwindling food supply. Since late September, the United States has assisted in the supplying of food to many hungry citizens of the U.S.S.R. On Tuesday, February 10, 1992, Operation Provide Hope was launched to bring food, medical supplies, and much-needed comfort to the struggling citizens of the Soviet Union. The downfall of the communist system has left the majority of the population penniless. In addition, the store shelves, no longer being filled by governmental funds, remain barren. However, because the Soviet citizens are in a time of financial devastation, products necessary for survival cannot be purchased anyway. President Bush, in strengthening relations with the Soviet Union, has offered United States assistance to the chaotic population of the ever-changing Soviet Union. Hopefully, with this aid, the world will progress toward a more peaceful union. Until then, the radical develop-



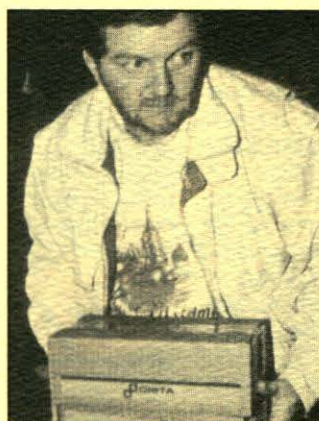

Proposition 2½

How the Cuts Measure Up

State aid to towns across the Commonwealth were cut back sharply. In Chelmsford this created a drastically reduced town budget. Considering the already reduced revenue, this hit town departments to the point of breaking. In order to serve the town adequately, the school committee, police department, fire department, solid waste commission and the library submitted budgets that would require a proposition 2½ override veto. At Town Meeting on April 30, representatives passed a \$41 million budget and agreed to put the five menu style questions on the June fourth special election ballot.

In the schools, failure to pass the override would result in the loss of 81.5 employees and \$569,072 of program and operating expenses. The school district would lose 8 elementary teaching positions, 13.5 secondary teachers, 3.5 special education teachers, 5 counselors, 1 high school dean, 4 custodians, 5.5 support personnel, 9.6 specialist teachers, 3 librarians, 1 director of elementary education, 28 education support personnel, and 4 department heads. This would result in the increase in class size, the elimination of elementary and middle school library programs, and all but one elementary counselor. The failure to pass the override would also result in the elimination of 45 course offerings at the high school and it would have a high impact on the activities and athletic programs.

The school committee and Dr. Richard Moser, Superintendent of Schools, came up with a three step plan to address the financial problem. Step one was to make some very difficult cuts totaling \$1,081,000. Step two was that all the employees would make a contribution. The employees are giving up 50% of their contracted raises in the act of good faith. The third step was to work with the Board of Selectmen, Finance Committee, Town Representatives and the voters to gain support. If the override is not passed the state will cut more of its funding to Chelmsford. The school committee is doing all it can to promote the passage of the override. In the recent Blue Print 2000 survey in all precincts, 82.9% people listed education as their number one priority for the Town of Chelmsford for the coming decade.

On June 4, 1991, the voters of Chelmsford showed their support of the schools by passing the \$950,000 override. Dr. Richard Moser and the school committee did their homework and they presented a credible case and the voters accepted it.

Community Joins to Support the Schools

The prospect of an override of Proposition 2½ in our community out to support the schools. The people in the community are not just thinking of themselves, they are thinking of all the children and teachers who are in the school system. Throughout Chelmsford people were supporting the schools. Members of a committee "Education Matters" held signs in the center and handed out bumper stickers that said Education Matters. Other residents of Chelmsford supported the schools by supporting the fundraisers.

McCarthy. SADD raised money at a Burger King day to help spread the message that drinking and driving is dangerous. Without the help of the community these fundraisers would have flopped.

The residents of Chelmsford realize that the schools are important, and with the crisis at hand they are ready to come together as a community to deal with the crisis. Although this crisis will not directly impact the course of world events in the months to come, it does affect the type of education the youth of the town can look to. Help everyone in the town support education because education matters.

Triumph, Trouble, and Trial

The latter part of 1991 and the beginning of 1992 was a memorable period in the history of sports; one that saw many stories that will, undoubtedly, be etched in the annals of athletics. The time was marked by outstanding achievements and tearful tragedies, both on and off the playing field. Moments of elation were placed against episodes of anguish, all of which created an interesting blend that will be long remembered.

Mike Powell

The most outstanding personal achievement came in early September of 1991 when Mike Powell, jumped 29 feet 4½ inches, accomplishing a feat few thought possible. The previous mark of 29 feet 2½ inches, set by Bob Beamon in 1968, was popularly considered unsurpassable. To put Beamon's mark in context, his jump was compared with Joe Dimaggio's 56 game hitting streak of 1941.

The record was particularly poignant for the 27 year old Powell. For much of his career he had gone largely unnoticed, even after winning an Olympic Silver Medal in 1988. He had been hidden in the omnipresent shadow of Carl Lewis, who was regarded as the most likely jumper to break Beamon's record. Powell's record jump came in a meet in which Lewis was also participating. Before his record-breaking jump, Powell had never beaten Lewis in 15 attempts. Powell had come close before — losing to Lewis by only half an inch in June of 1991, but he had never bettered him.

After Powell's jump, he was, at last, given the recognition he deserved. He came in second place in the Associated Press' Male Athlete of the Year Award, losing to basketball's Michael Jordan. He did, however, edge out Carl Lewis, who came in third.

Magic Johnson

Possibly the most well-known sports story of 1991 did not actually involve a scoring accomplishment, but, rather, an athlete's personal tragedy. The sports world, in fact, the whole world, was shocked and dismayed when L.A. Lakers superstar Magic Johnson announced he had contracted the virus that causes AIDS. Because of the disease, the three-time NBA Most Valuable Player retired

from professional basketball. Magic, the NBA's all-time assist leader, did say that he would still play in the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona, where he will undoubtedly be warmly received for his courage and dignity. Throughout the early stages of his ordeal, Magic remained upbeat, never losing the characteristic smile that made him famous.

Mike Tyson

Former Heavyweight Champion of the World, Mike Tyson, was found guilty of raping an 18 year old beauty pageant contestant. At this writing, Tyson could be sentenced to as many as 60 years in prison, although it is estimated that he will actually serve 8 to 12 years.

Tyson, who was at one time the youngest heavyweight Champion, had a quick and immense fall from grace. Exactly

two years to the day prior to being found guilty, Tyson lost his Championship belt to Buster Douglas in Tokyo. Since then, suspicion has grown that Tyson was both a sexual pervert and a "serial buttocks fonder." The rape charge levied against him, stemmed from the accusation of a Providence College freshman competing in the Miss Black America beauty contest held in Indianapolis. Tyson, who was a judge in this contest, was found guilty of the rape and two other counts.

Tyson, first arrested at the age of nine, has been through much

The Minnesota Twins of the American League and the Atlan-

ta Braves of the National League met in the best-of-seven-games showdown. Preceding the Braves' superb season, their attempts at winning were largely an exercise in futility. The recession that gripped the nation during 1991 also affected the entertainment industry. The movie and music industries experienced low ticket sales and concert attendance. Video cassette rentals soared to record highs as Americans chose to save money by viewing movies at home. Thus, films predicted as box-office blockbusters often fared poorly in movie theaters. Recession in the music industry also led to disappointing sales of major star's releases during 1991. Concerts and shows across the country were canceled due to low ticket sales. In a year in which many Americans stayed at home, television ratings should have soared. However, the lack of groundbreaking programs led to low ratings for the television industry. The negative impact of the recession often overshadowed the positive stories in movies, music, and television. New faces and new stars came on to the scene, while appearances and performances from old stars reminded us that they were not to be forgotten.

This year Madonna made news, not with her music, but with her revealing documentary *Truth or Dare*. The most pleasant surprise of the year was the Disney cartoon *Beauty and the Beast*. The film gained applause from viewers and critics of all ages.

The music industry saw releases from many new artists and old favorites. The Boston based rock group Extreme gained nationwide fame with their two hit singles *More Than Words* and *Hole Hearted*. Newcomer Mariah Carey displayed her powerful voice on her debut album *Mariah Carey* and her second release titled

"Emotions." C&C Music Factory stood atop the charts with its dance tunes from their album "Gonna Make You Sweat." Gospel singer Amy Grant made a successful switch to pop with her "Heart in Motion" album. British group Jesus Jones' single "Right Here, Right Now" was one of the biggest alternative-radio hits of 1991. The harmonizing of Wilson Phillips and the deep, powerful voice of Michael Bolton assisted these performers in reaching top positions on the charts. Long time college campus favorite R.E.M. gained praise and Grammy nominations for their single "Losing My Religion" and their album entitled "Out of Time." Michael Jackson released his eagerly anticipated album "Dangerous" to mixed reviews. On the rock scene, Guns and Roses introduced two new releases called "Use Your Illusion 1" and "Use Your Illusion 2." Favorite rockers AC/DC released their new work "The Razor's Edge" and Van Halen rocked on with "For Unlawful Carnal Knowledge." GENERATION OF FADS

From Bermuda bags and monogrammed sweaters to boom-boxes and transformers; "slinky" bracelets and friendship pins on sneakers to velcro sneakers and anything fluorescent, each and every fad was contagious. Do you remember breakdancing? Or those tacky charm necklaces? They had large links that were filled with attachments like little plastic phones, skiis, or rollerskates, all bought right at the Chelmsford Gift Shop.

When we hit fourth grade, "Valley Girl" lingo swept in from the West. This was when we began to refer to anything and everything positive as "awesome." Soon, saying "like" and "awesome" became as common to us as blinking.

At about the same time, we were hit with the "sticker collection" fad. Most everyone, girls especially, owned a photo album with static pages. The album was filled with, what else, stickers. Our sticker albums were our most prized possessions. Every once in a while we would make a trade with a friend, but that was rare. We could sit for hours on end and admire our "smelly's," "squishy's," and "googly-yed's," growing prouder with each turn of the page.

While in fourth grade, we, along with the rest of the world, were taken by "Michael Jackson Mania." Young girls and boys were nuts over him. We screamed at the release of "Thriller," cried when his hair caught on fire during production of a Pepsi-Cola commercial, and sang along with "Billie Jean" and "Say, Say, Say." We bought every Michael Jackson product we could get our hands on: pillowcases, notebooks, T-shirts, posters, and the picture biography. Anyone who could do the moonwalk was definitely "awesome."

Last, but by far not the least, were those irresistible, pudgy-face-to-die-for dolls: Cabbage Patch Kids. Each "kid" was a one-of-a-kind creation by Xavier Roberts, who put his signature on the "behind" of each doll. Appropriately, they had birthdays at the harvest time: September 1st, October 1st, and November 1st; they also had perfectly unique names like Faye Sherry, Barry Kent, Constance Winifred, and Ingrid Toby. The dolls came dressed in outfits equally as unique and they smelled like baby powder. Cabbage Patch Kids were so incredibly precious you were looked up to if you were lucky enough to have one in your possession. These dolls were cared for as if they were human. They were positively venerable.

As we moved on to junior high school, we were inevitably faced with puberty and adolescence. At that point in our lives, most of us were dealing with identity crises and immense pressures from within ourselves to fit in socially. This explains the multiplicity of fads we experienced in our mere two year stay at McCarthy Middle School.

Every detail on a person contributed to his or her acceptance to the group desired. Homework was carried home from school in Esprit bags. Brushes and hairspray were stored in Liz Claiborne or Gucci pocketbooks. On any given day, you could spot at least a dozen blue and white or green and white

Benetton rugby shirts tucked into a pair of Guess jeans. This held true for both sexes. Anyone with an inverted triangle on their tush knew what was cool. Furthermore, anyone who could put out the \$56 for a pair of Guess overalls deserved special recognition.

While the girls were busy lending and borrowing clothes with each other, the boys were involved in fads of their own. Polo cologne, or aftershave if it happened to be the case, became the "cool" trademark, along with Guess jeans and suspenders. One by one they turned up with heads of shaved or spiked hair, sometimes even higher than the girls'.

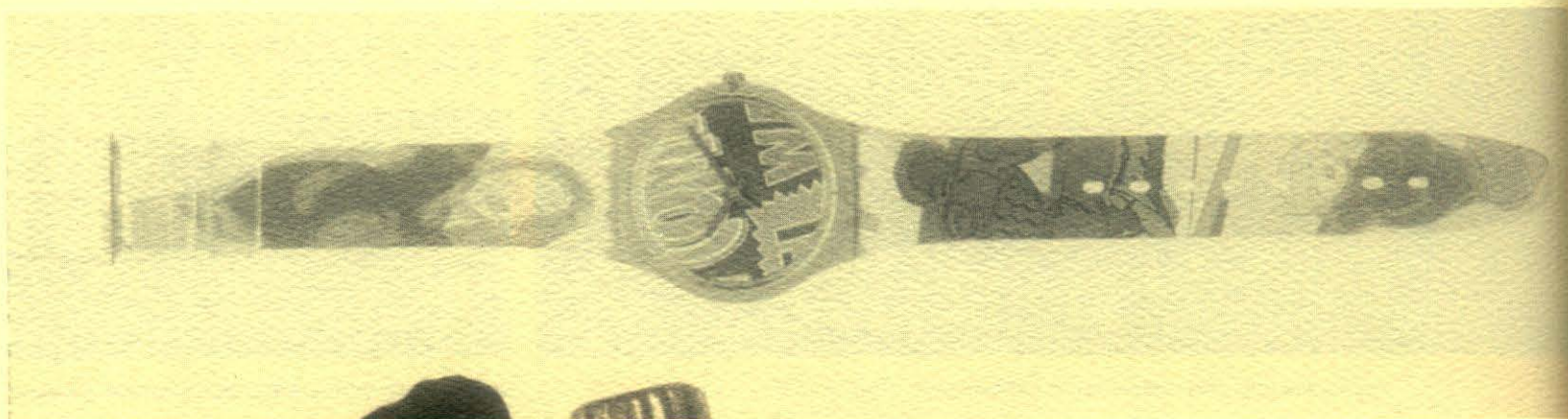

World AIDS Cases Approach One Half Million

AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome) stems from HIV (Human Immunodeficiency Virus). This virus destroys the body's ability to fight off infection by breaking down the immune system.

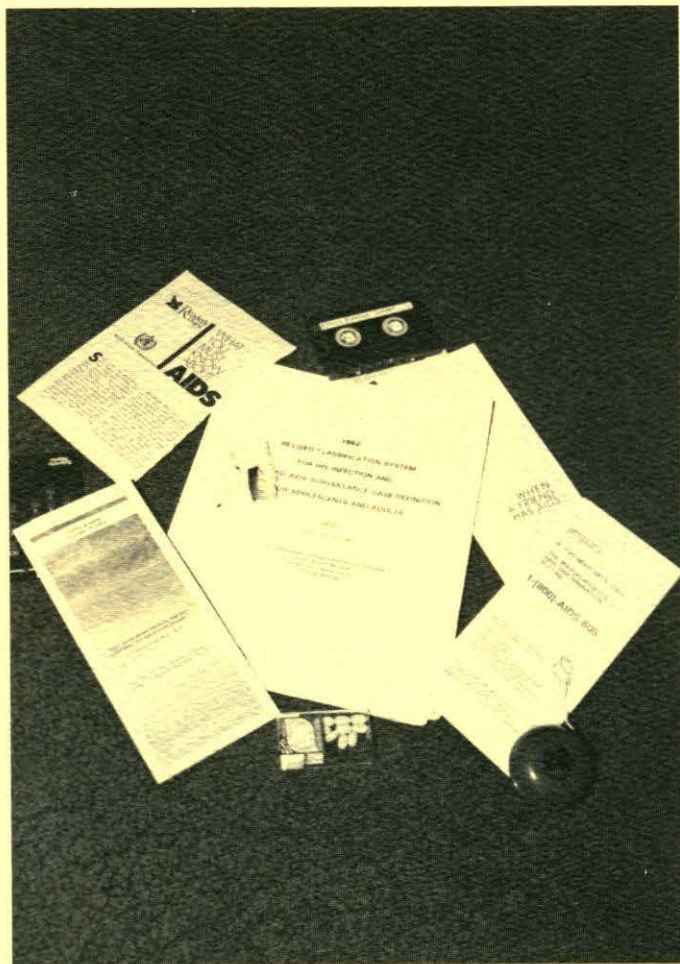
Over one half the people infected by the virus have already died, and the other half will. Despite the extensive research being done around the world, there is no cure, only several drugs, such as AZT, have been developed that can enhance the life of those infected. But even these drugs can't stop the virus; eventually, those patients will die.

Originally, AIDS was thought to be an illness of homosexuals and drug users, but that is a falsehood. Anyone can get AIDS. It doesn't matter whether you're male or female, straight or gay. AIDS doesn't discriminate.

AIDS is a very difficult disease to become infected with. It is not spread through casual, everyday contact. It must be passed from the infected person to someone else through sexual contact, sharing of intravenous needles, blood to blood contact, or parent to embryo. Blood transfusions are no longer a risk due to mandatory screening of any blood donated after 1985. There are no other ways to become infected with the HIV virus.

The only preventative measure that can be taken during sexual intercourse (vaginal, oral, anal) is the use of a latex condom or "rubber" and a spermicide containing monoxynol-9. But there is still risk involved.

As of November, 1991 over 130,000 AIDS patients have died in the U.S. and over 200,000 others have contracted the virus. At this rate another victim is infected with HIV every eighteen seconds. Over 420,000 AIDS cases have been reported worldwide.

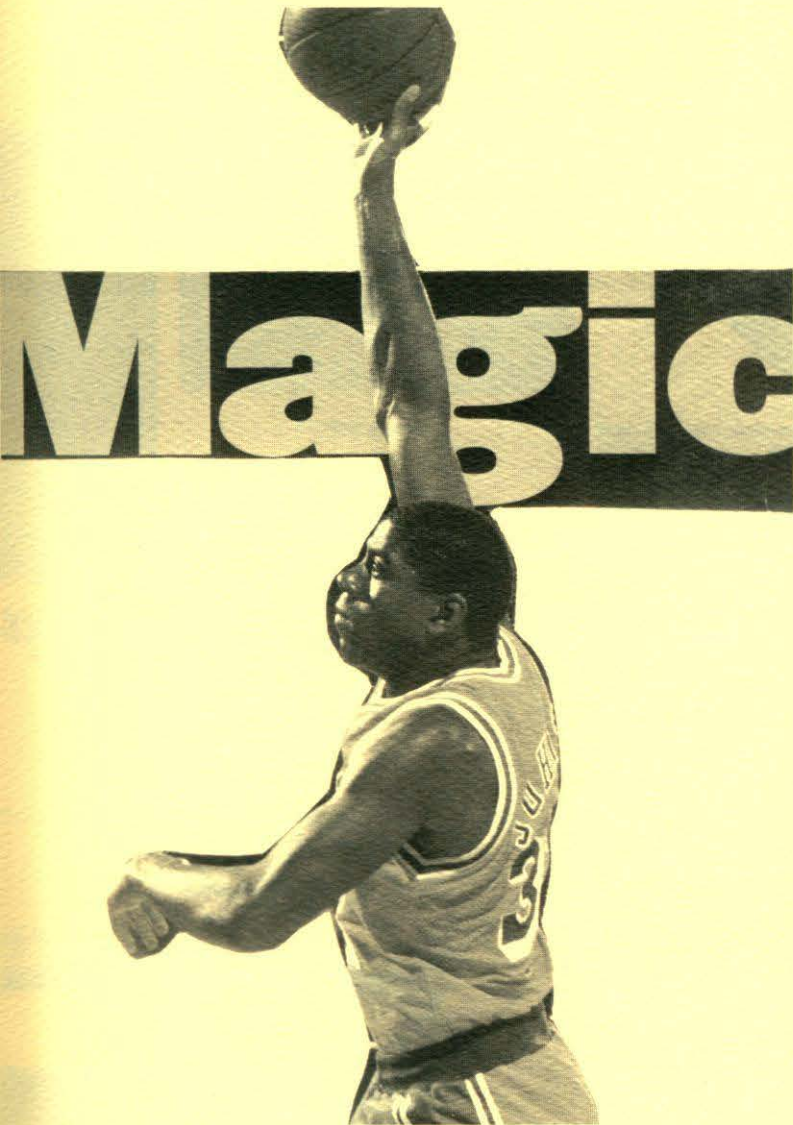

AIDS awareness has increased tremendously in the past decade. Condoms: From Bottom Shelf to Front Page

In recent years, the spread of HIV and AIDS has shed a whole new light on condoms: their usefulness, their importance. Condoms or "rubbers" were once nothing more than a very unpopular form of birth control in the generation when popular opinion was that it was the girl's responsibility to be careful.

The threat of AIDS increases by the day, and while the only one hundred percent safeguard is and always will be abstinence, condoms are now more than just birth control. They could save a life. While a birth control pill will only prevent pregnancy, a condom with spermicidal lubricant Monoxynol-9 will greatly reduce the transmission of HIV and other venereal diseases. These facts have produced a dramatic affect on society in recent years. Condoms are advertised in magazines and on television. Doctors recommend them, and some churches even approve their usage. In many poor American cities, they are even handed out free of charge. Use of condoms have come a long way from the bottom shelf behind the counter at the drug store. Yet, still others feel that it is not the responsibility of the schools to watch over the students and supply them with such items. If they are mature enough to be sexually active, then they are mature enough to walk into a store and buy a box of condoms. There are no right or wrong answers to this question. For now, the most important issue is to stop the spread of this disease. However this is achieved, it is everybody's problem.

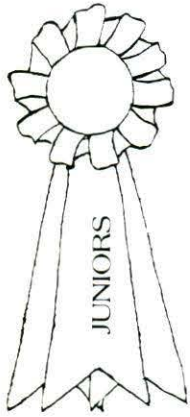
Juniors

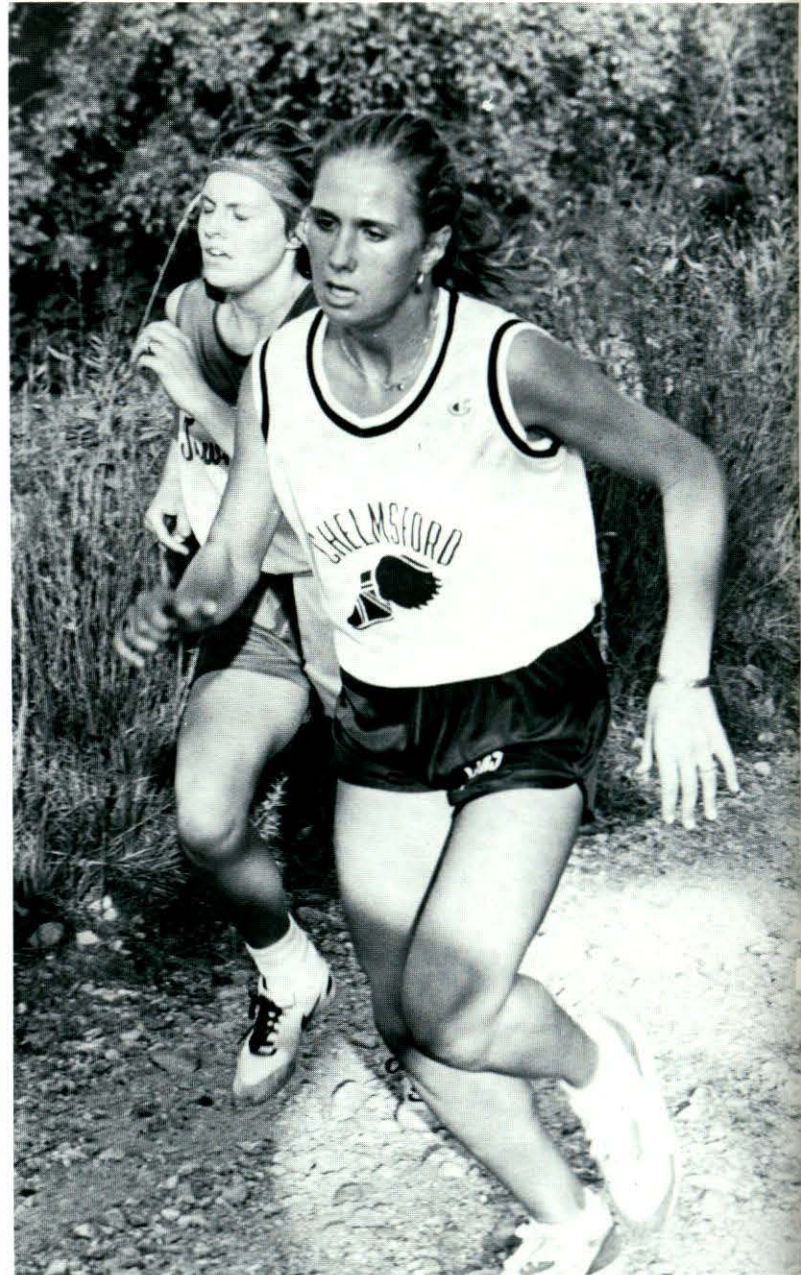

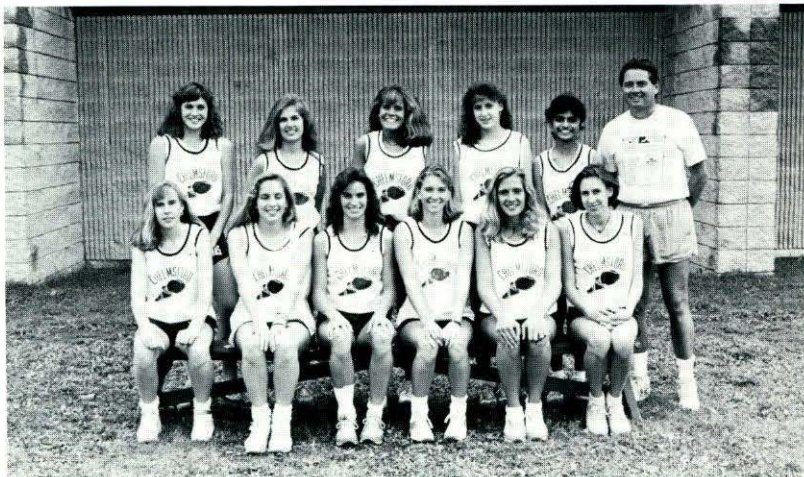
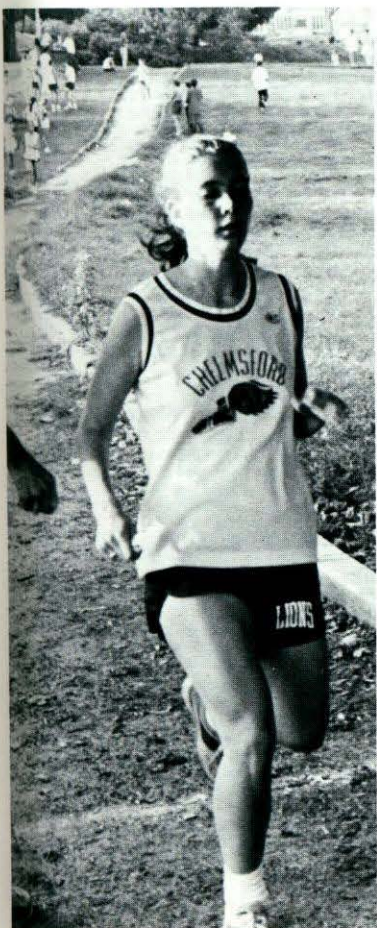

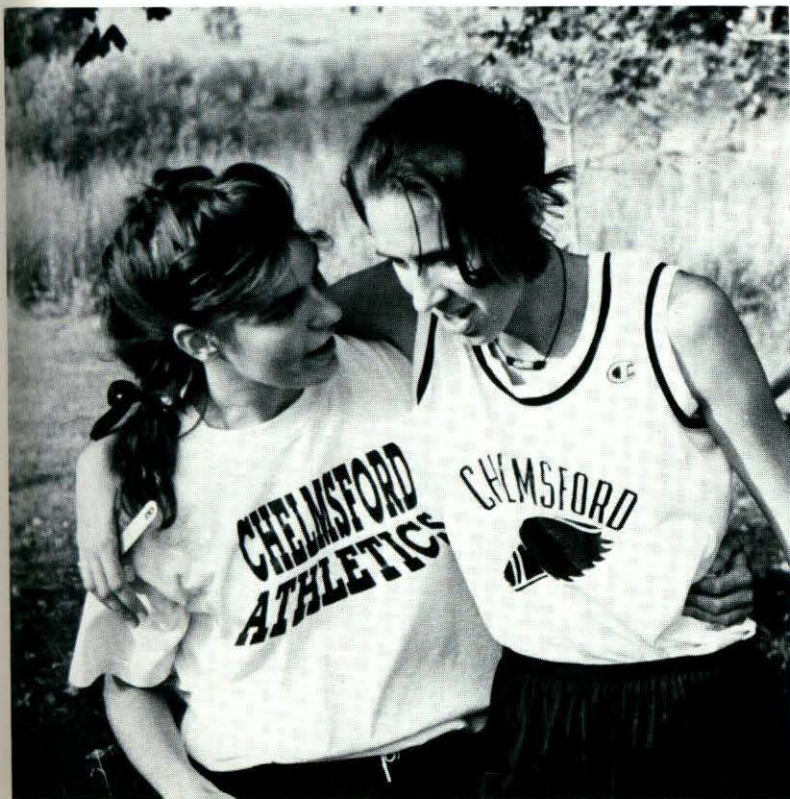

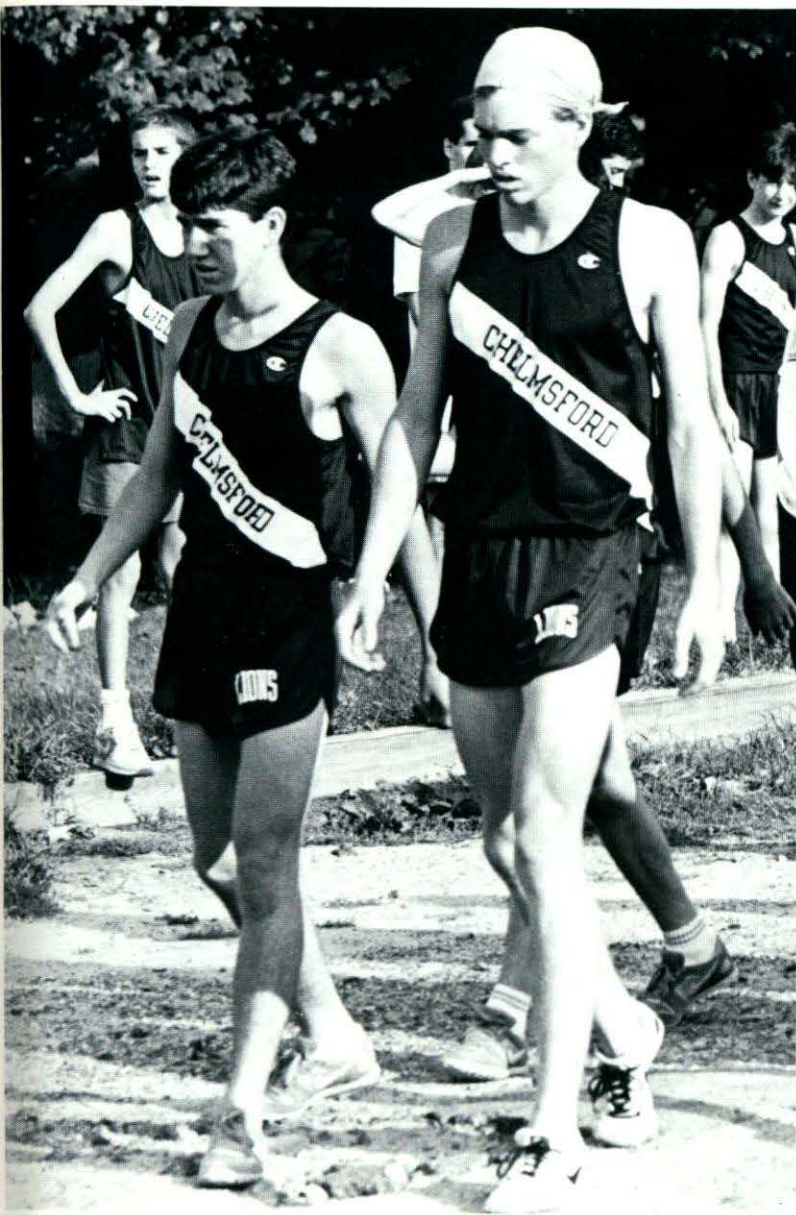

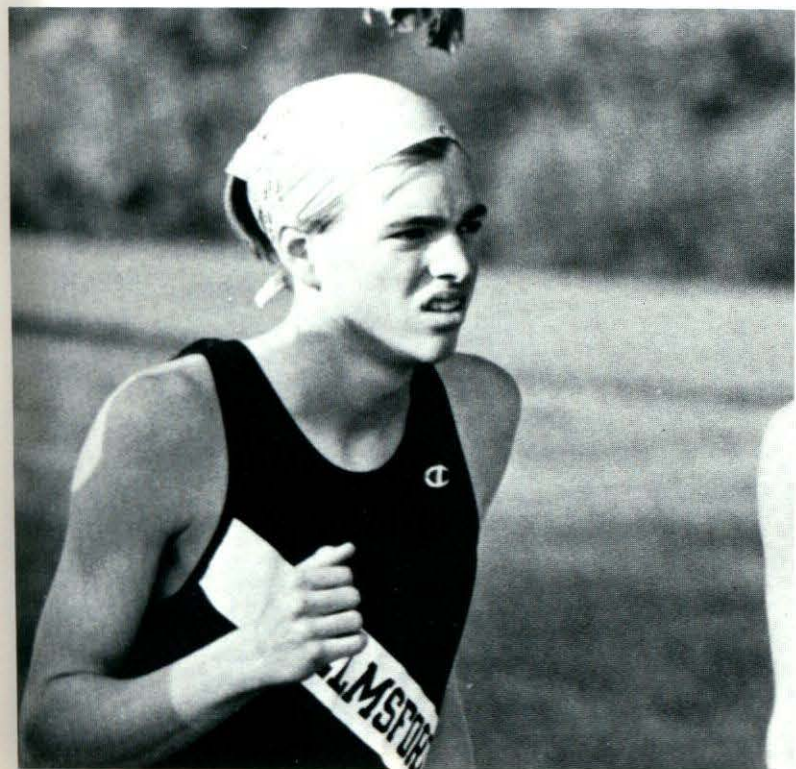

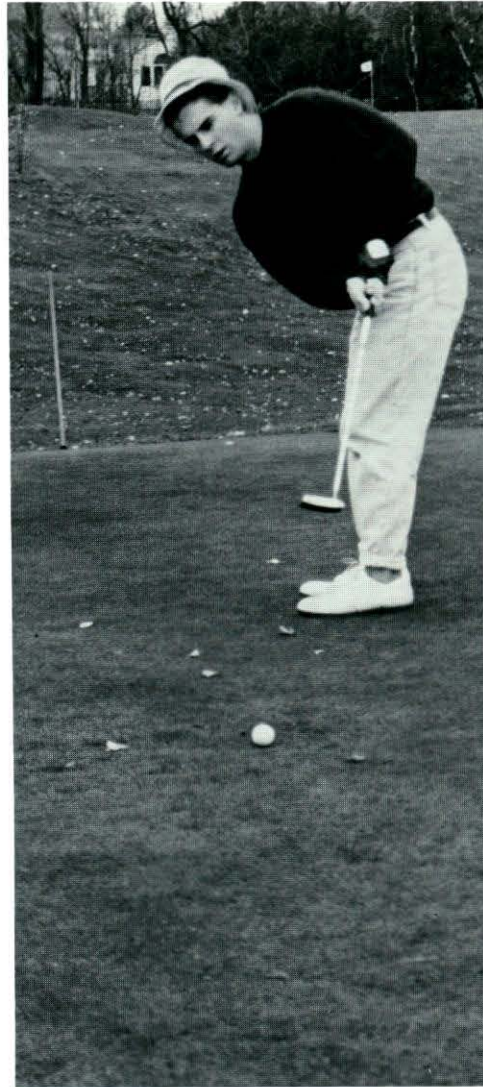
MVC Champs

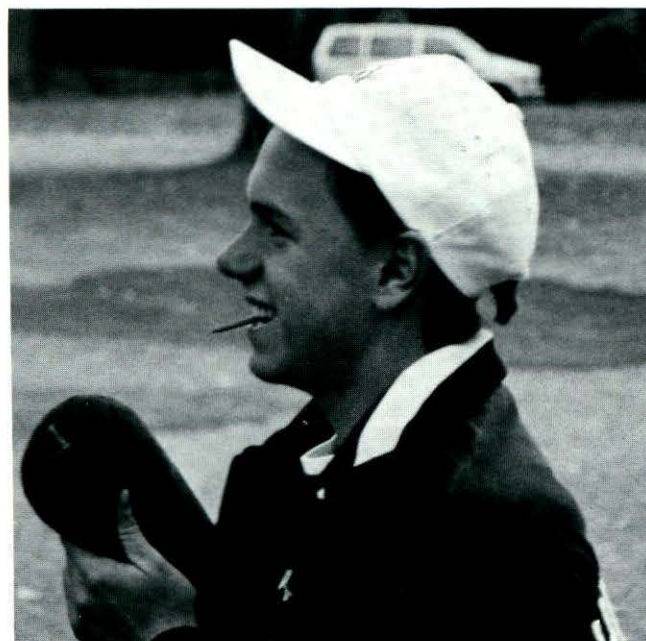

Fighting Lions

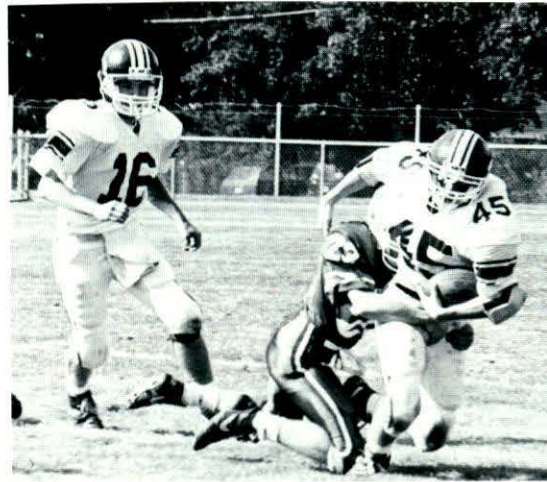

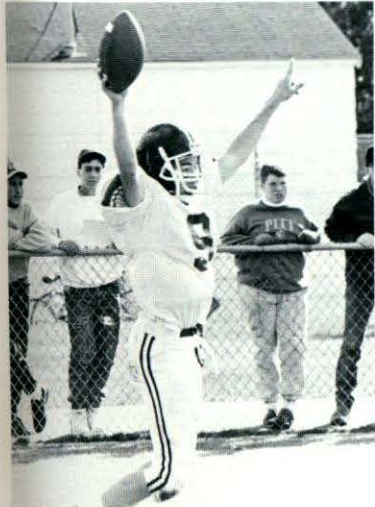

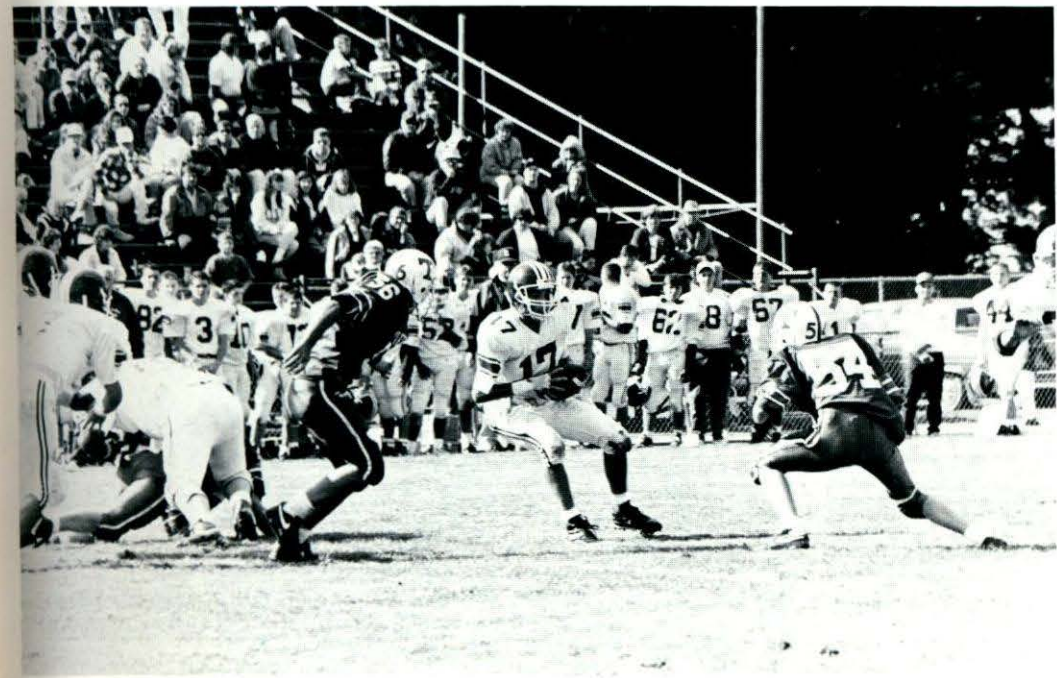

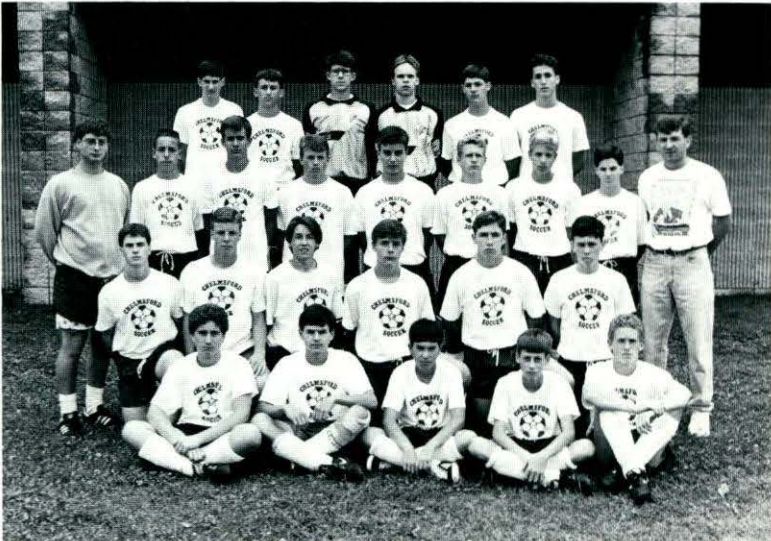

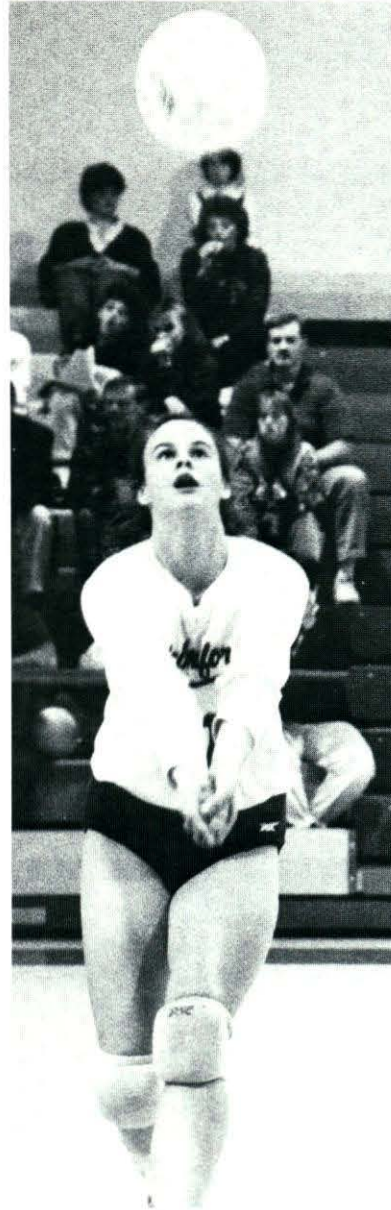
Surprising Strength

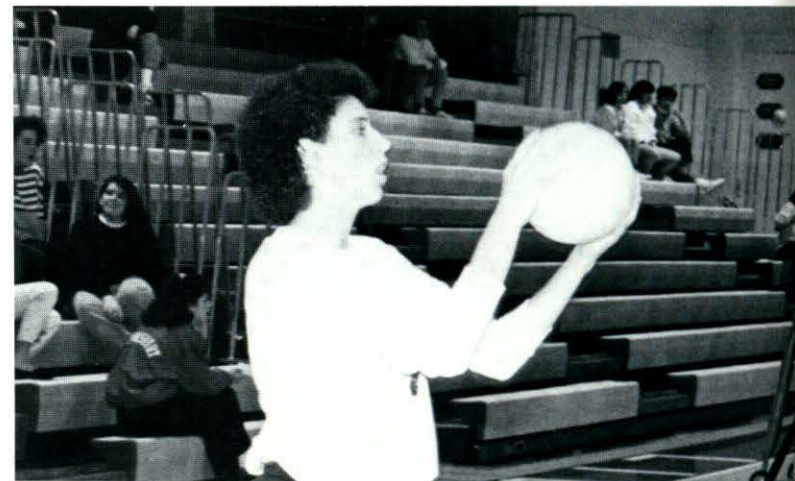

During the season, the team became a very close-knit group who regularly had team pasta parties and sleepovers. This helped the underclassmen to blend in with the seniors and make a stronger team.

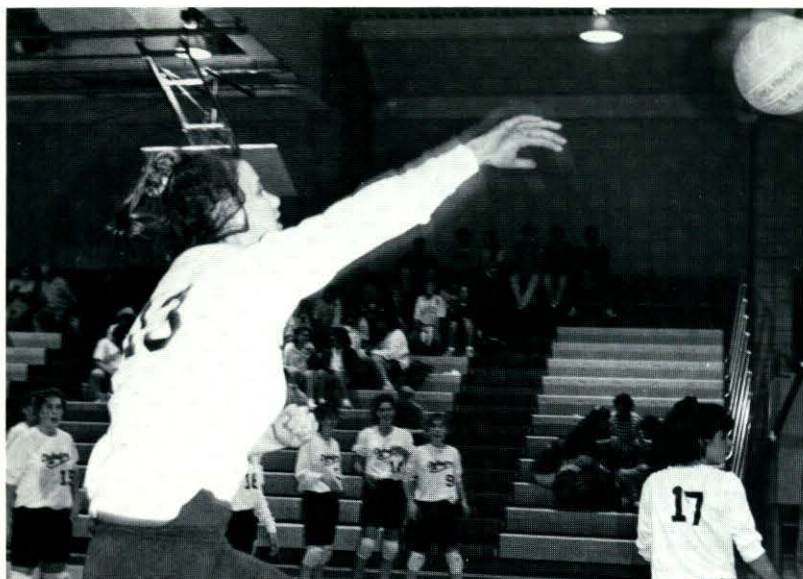

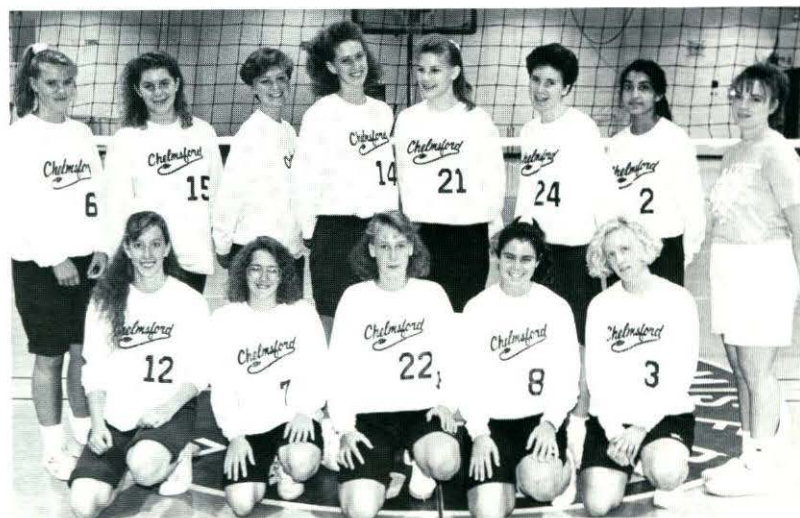

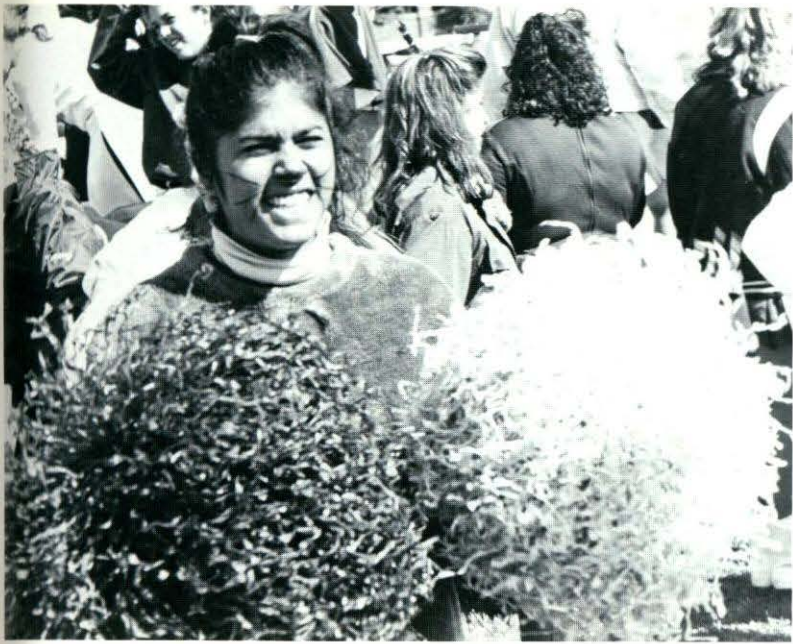

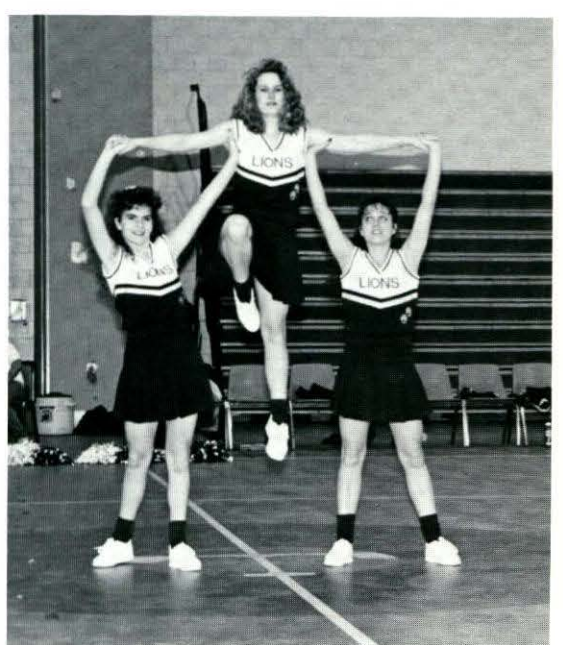

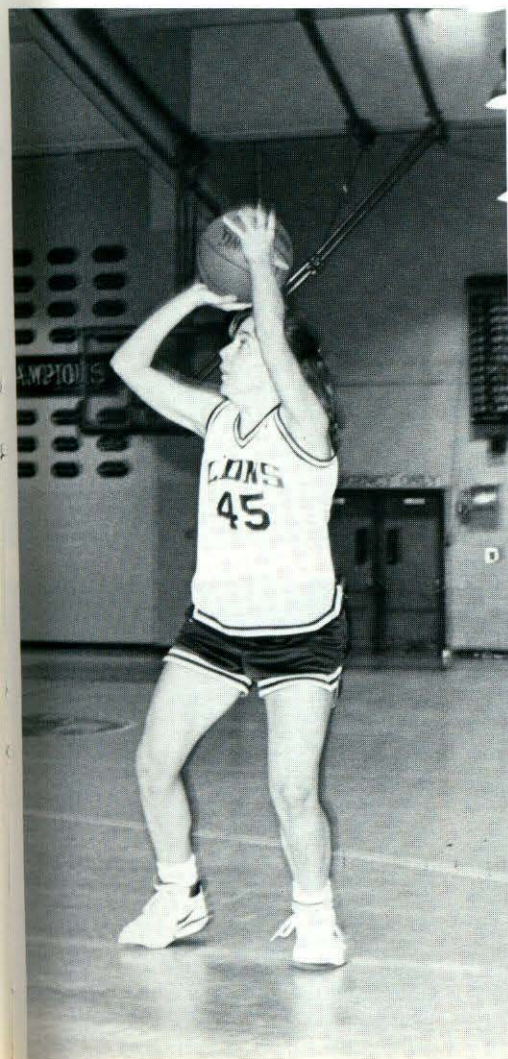

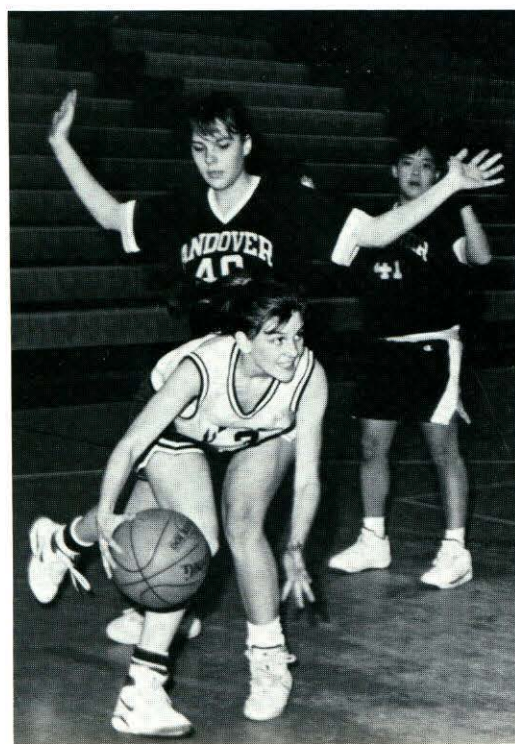

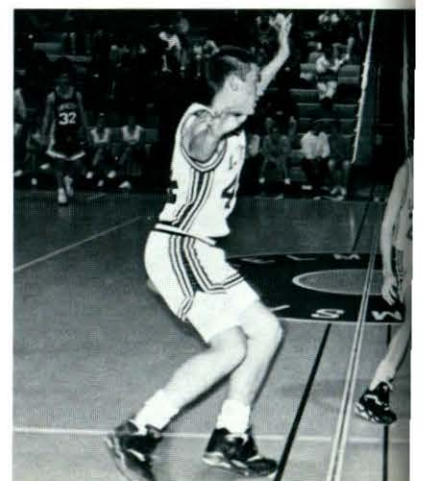

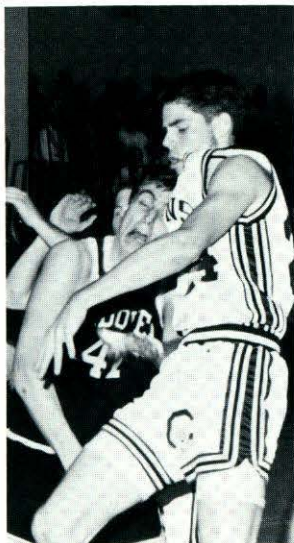


Senior Dan Petullo looks in vain for somebody to pass to as he is trapped on the baseline by an Andover player. Chelmsford came up short in this early season game.

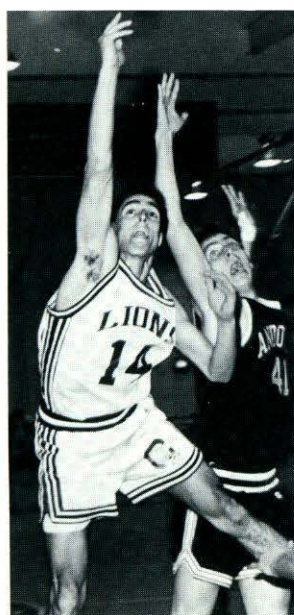


Senior Captain Kevin Branco punishes an Andover player in a fight for a rebound. Kevin's athleticism and ambidexterity proved invaluable to the team.

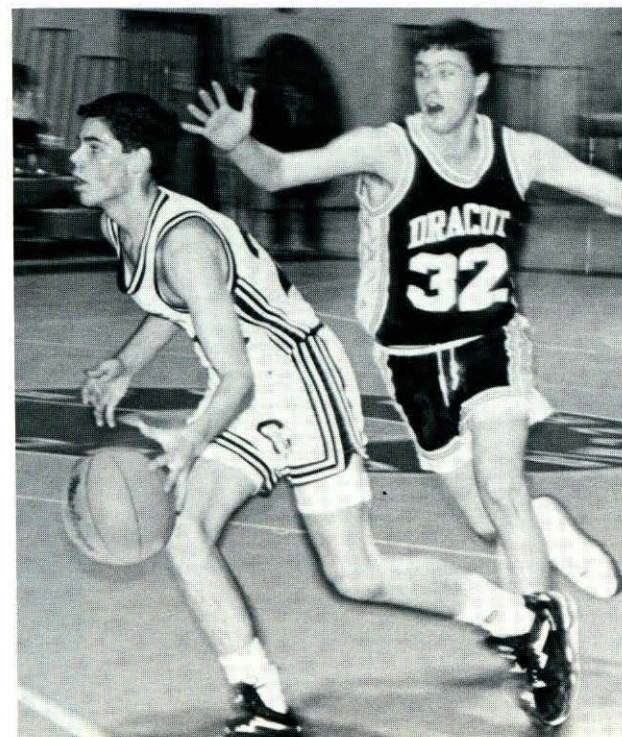

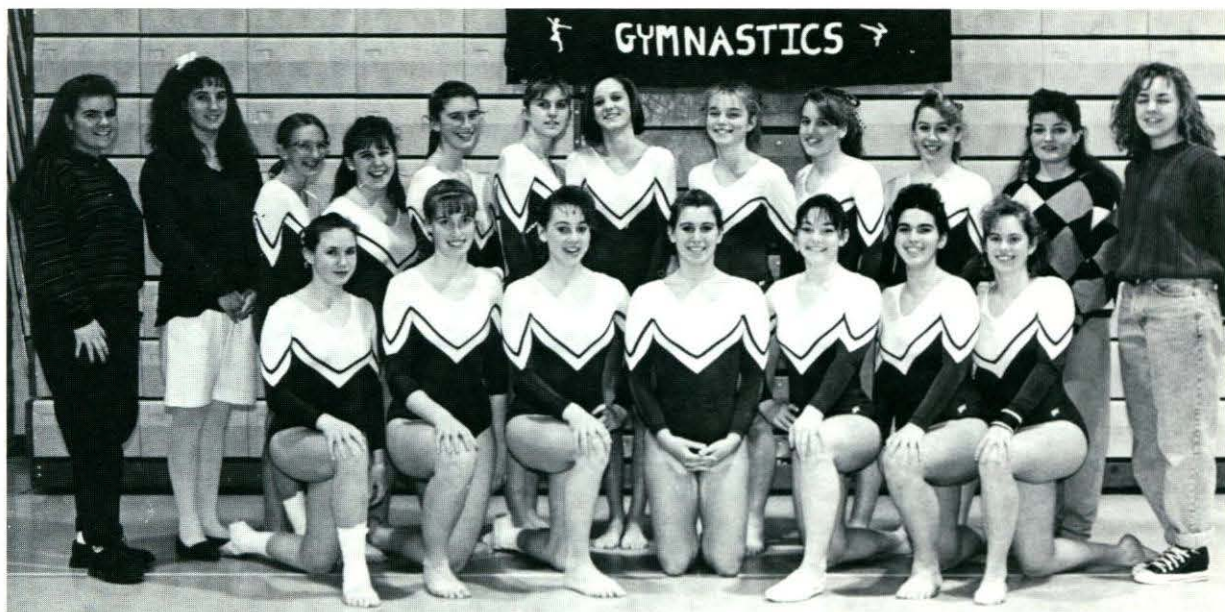

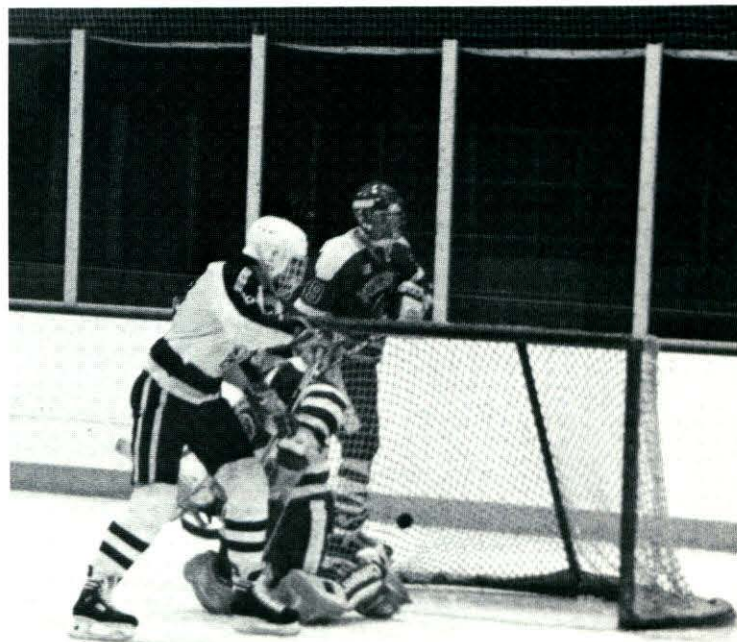

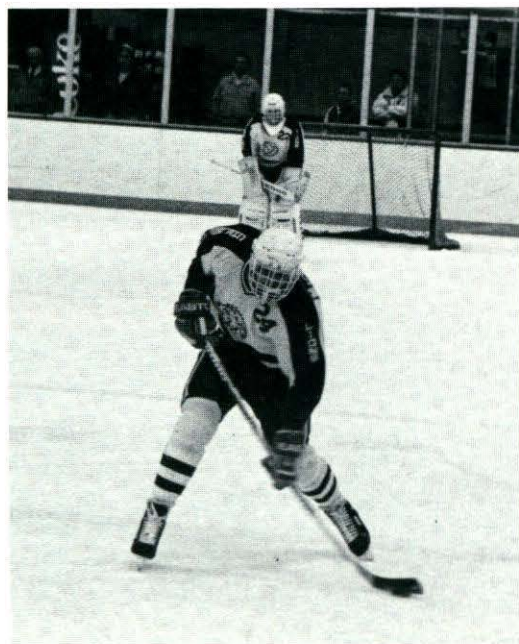

A "rebuilding year." You know you have an excellent program when a second place conference finish is considered to be a "rebuilding year."

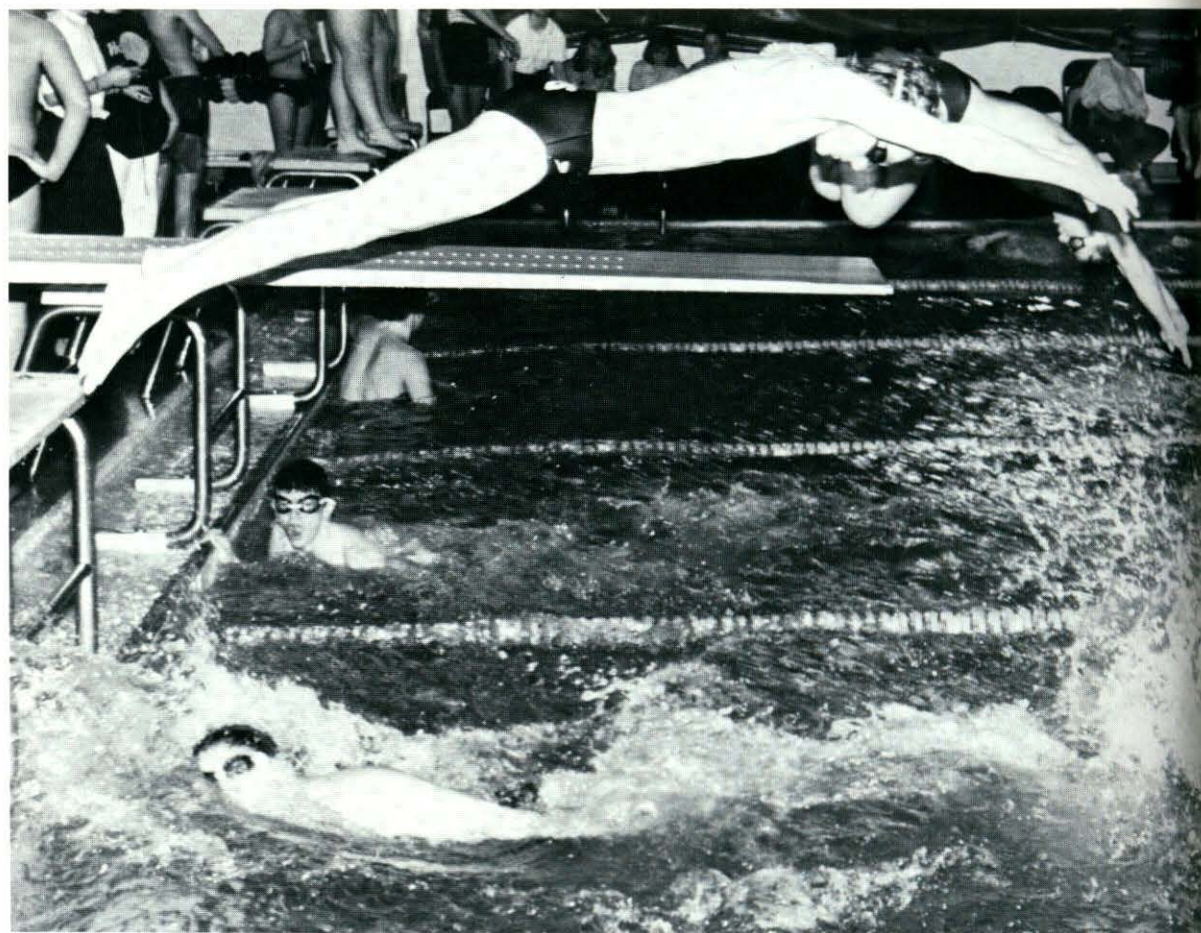

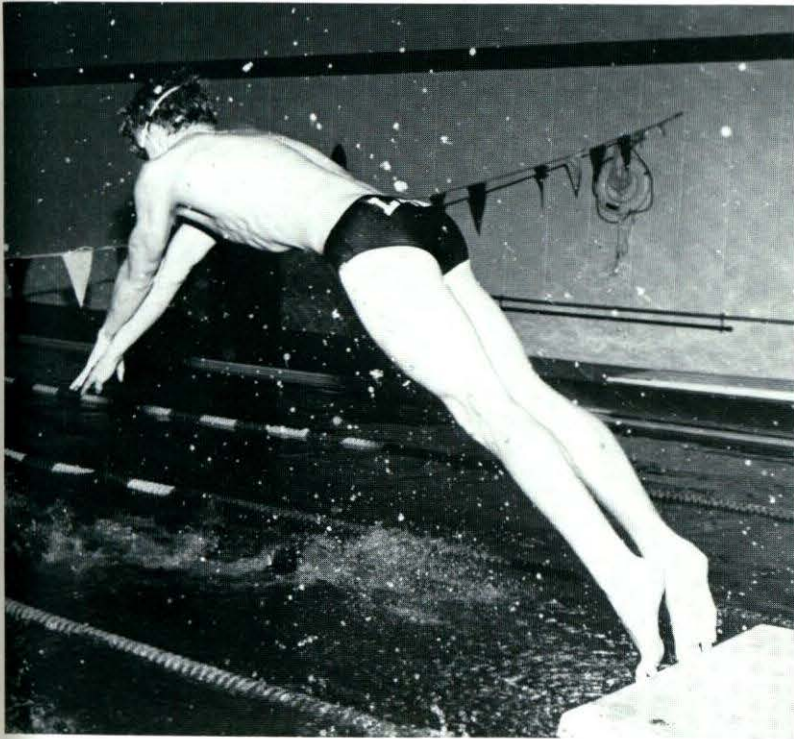

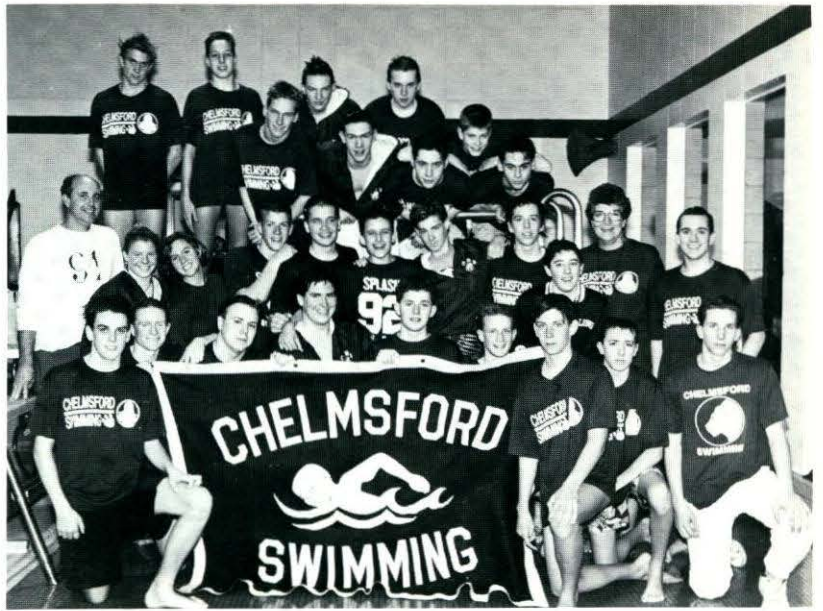

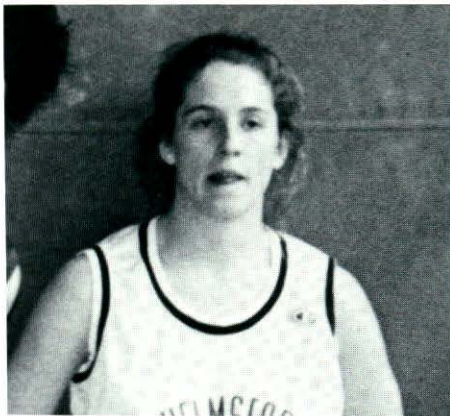
A Surprising Season

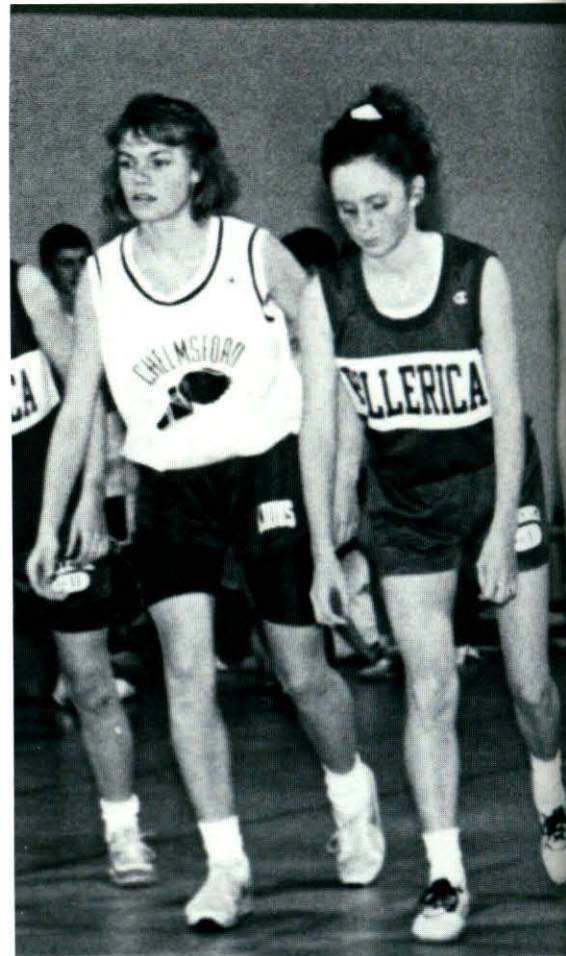

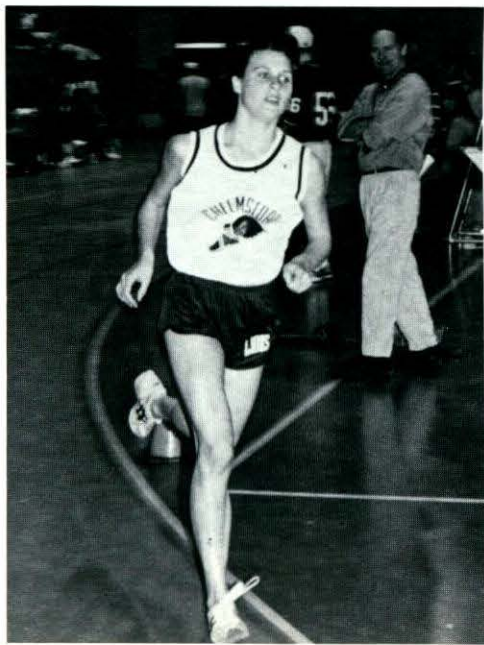

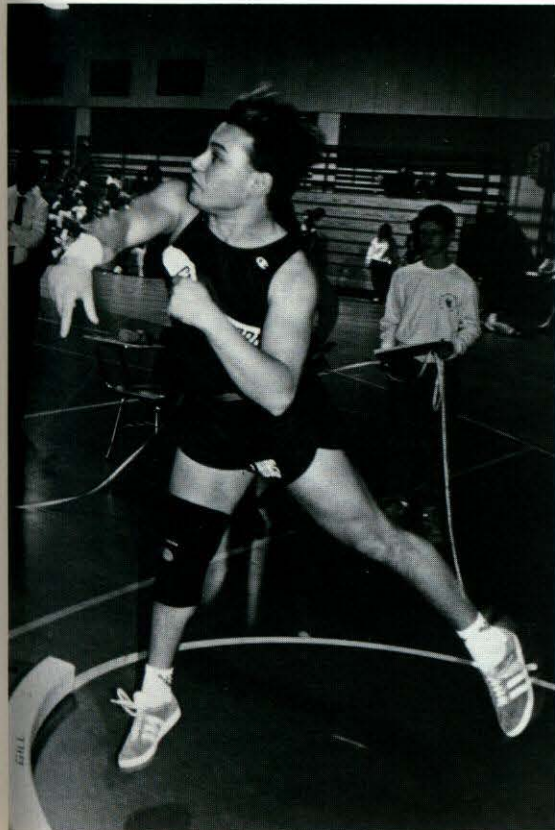

Continued Excellence

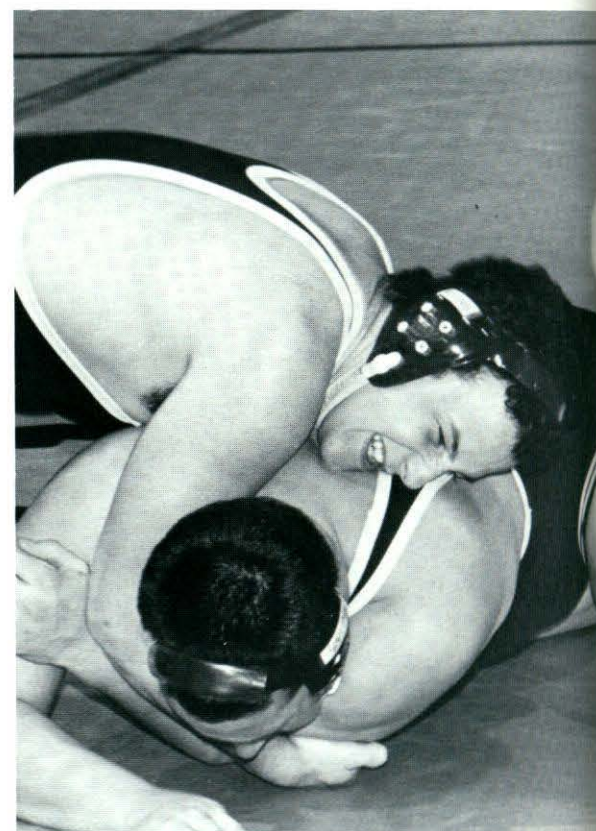

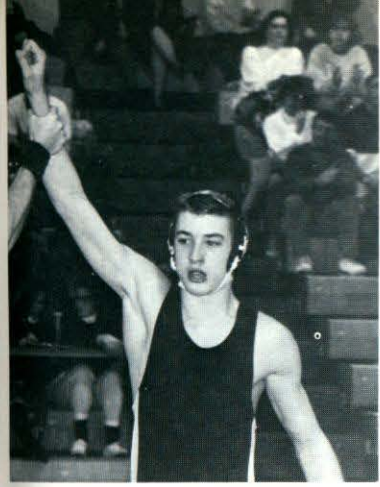

Senior Captain Jamie Worth demonstrates how he pinned more than twenty opponents this year.

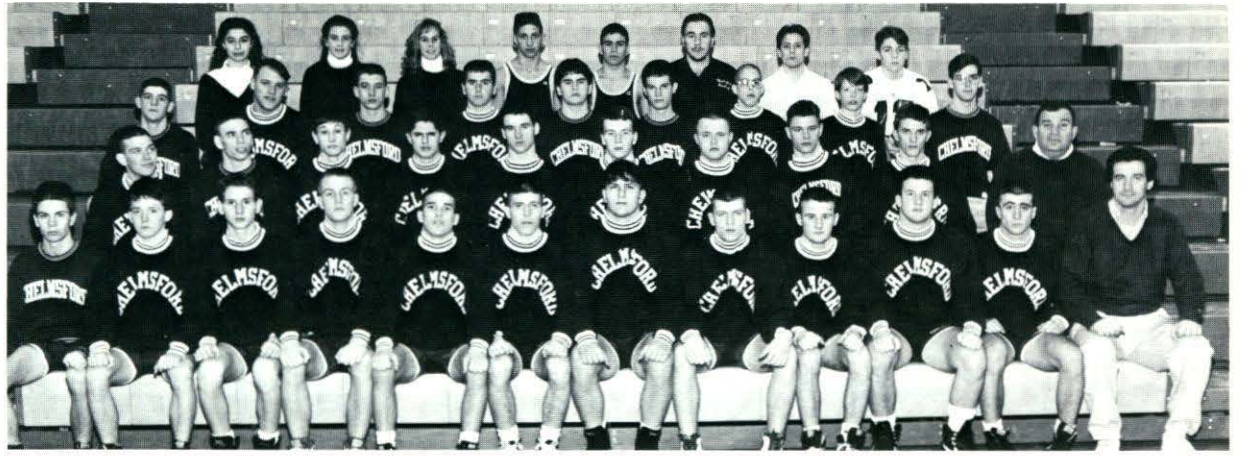

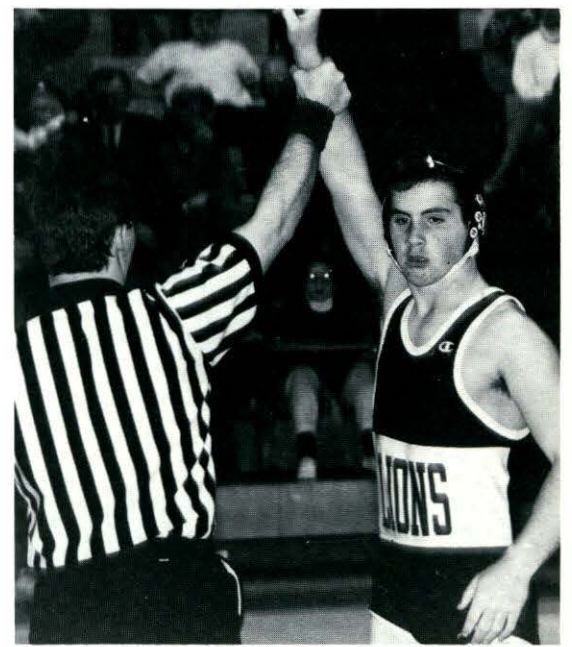

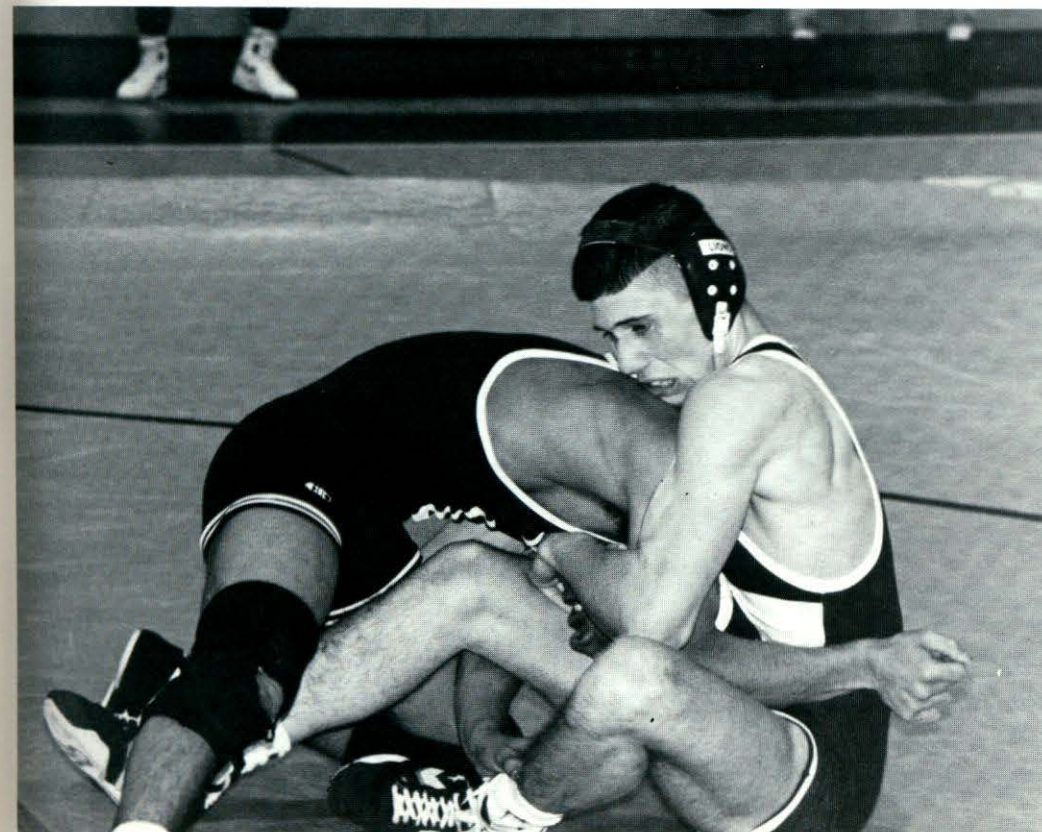

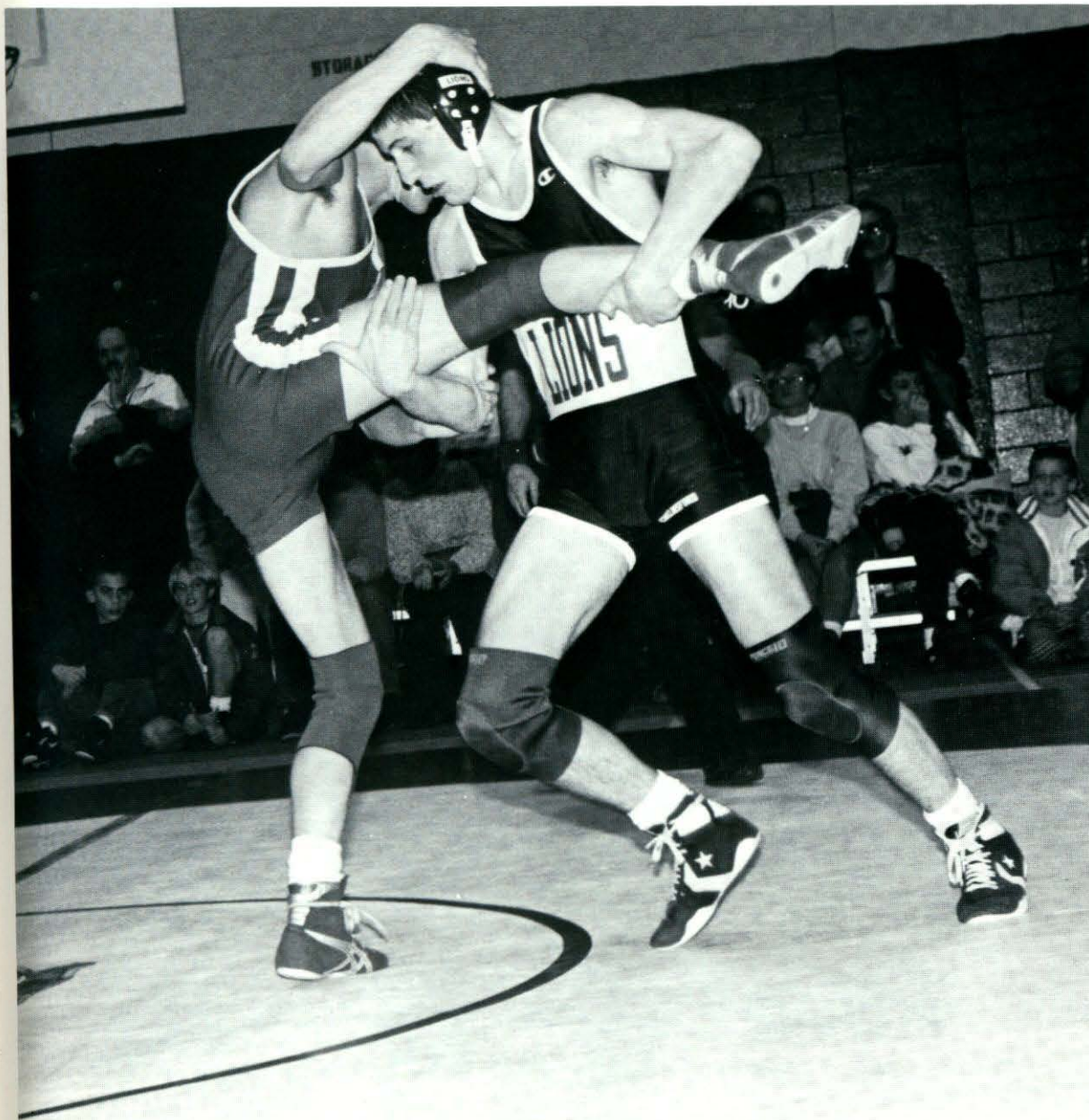

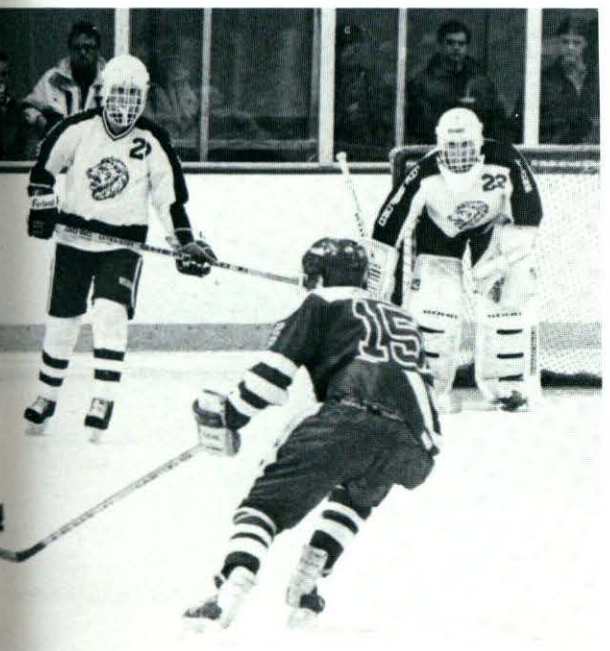

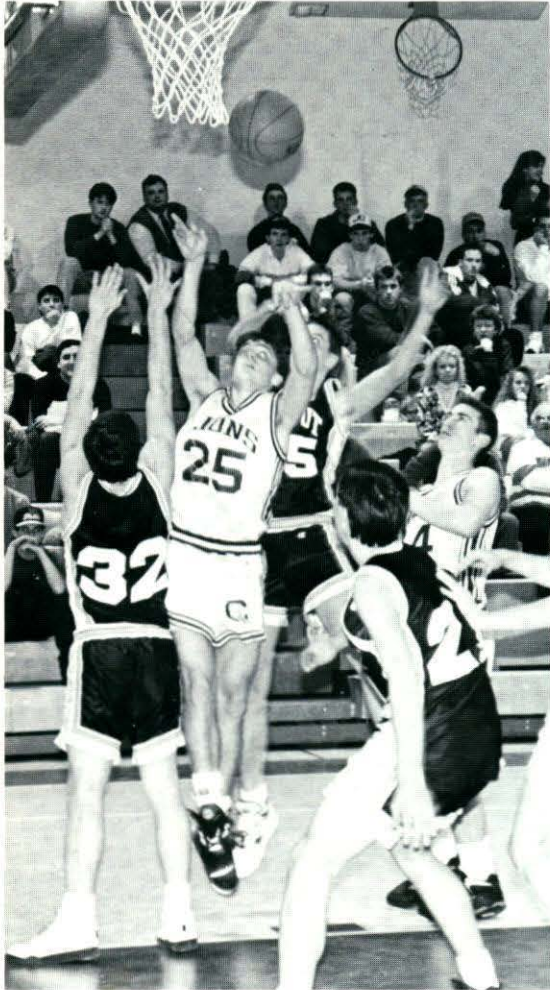
