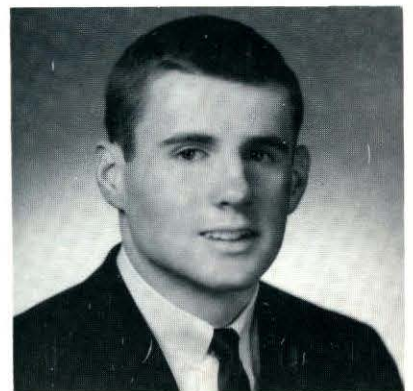
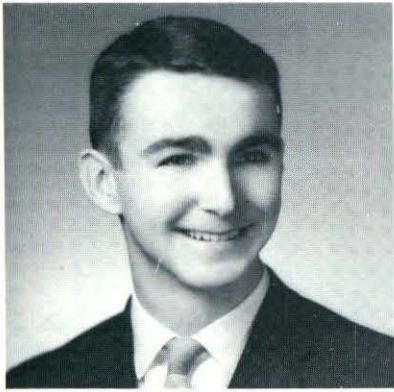
The Student Council was also proud to have Hannelore Andrae, our exchange student, as a guest at many meetings.

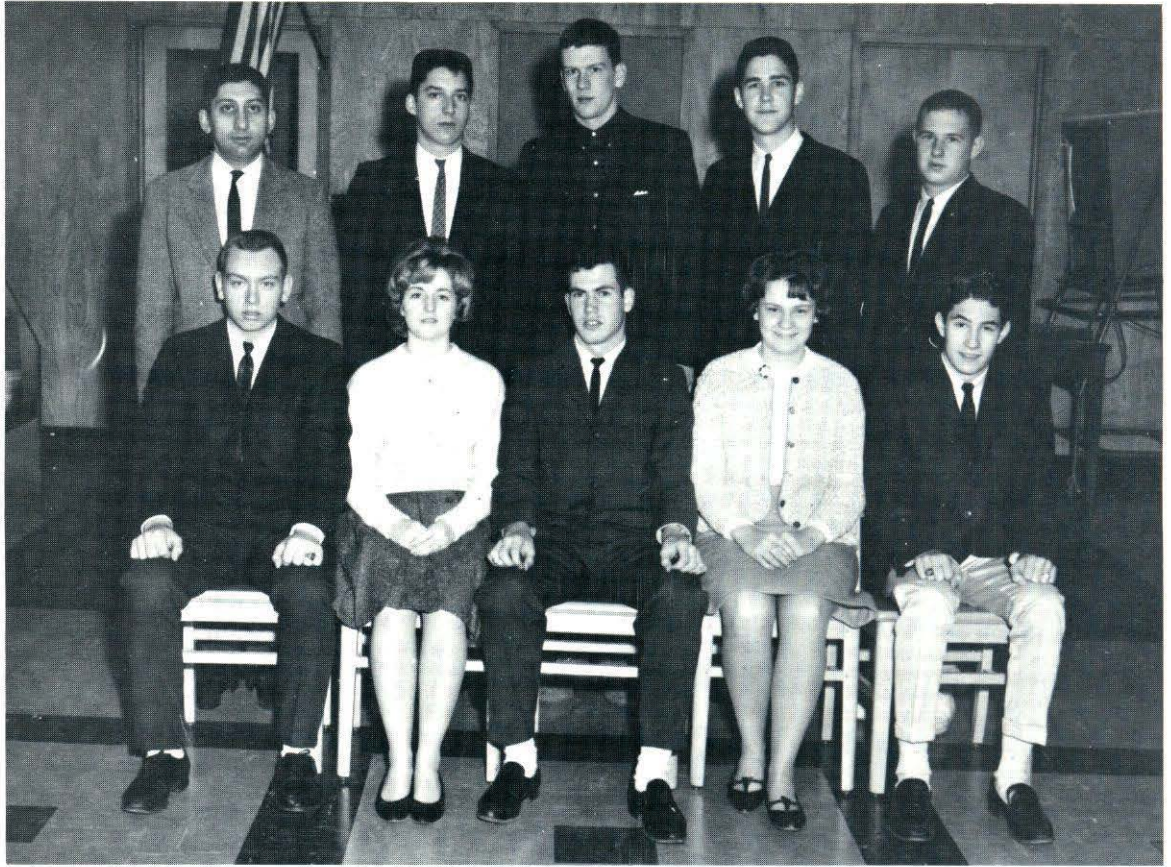


chelmsford high school store

The Photography Club has had as its major function, in 1963-1964, the taking of pictures of athletic events and all other school activities throughout the year.

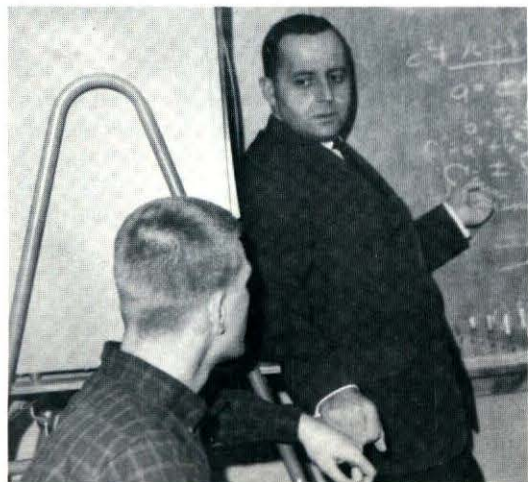
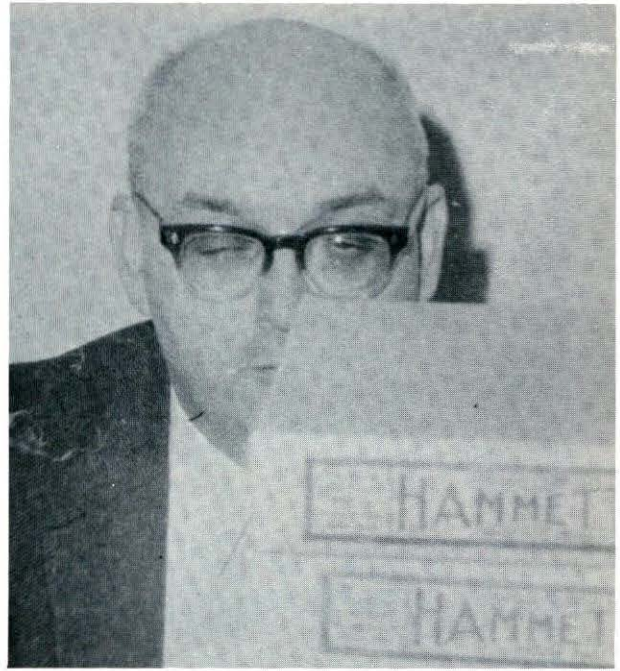

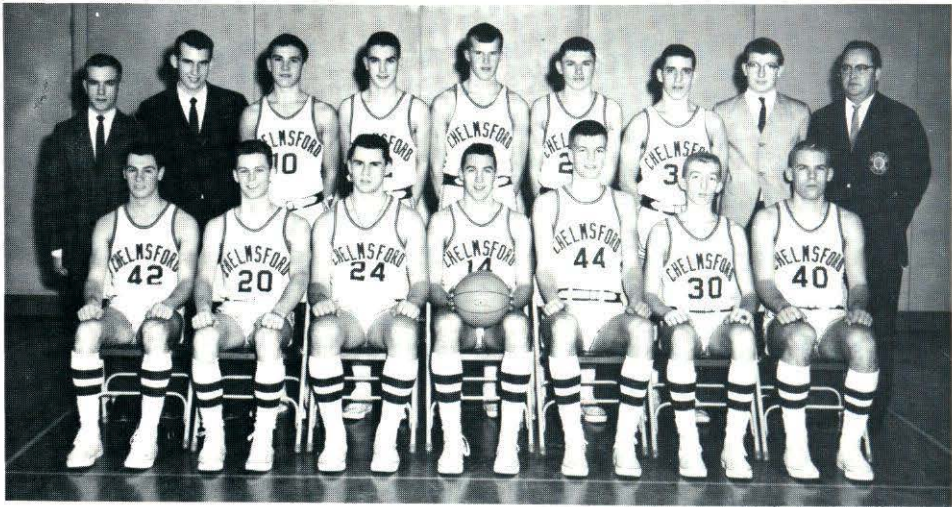
At the Suburban Championship meet, junior Stewart Bell took first place, followed closely by Ralph Merriman and Frank Cleary.

The Chelmsford Lions will be defending their crown at the Tech Tourney, hoping to retain their title as the Eastern Massachusetts Class C champions.

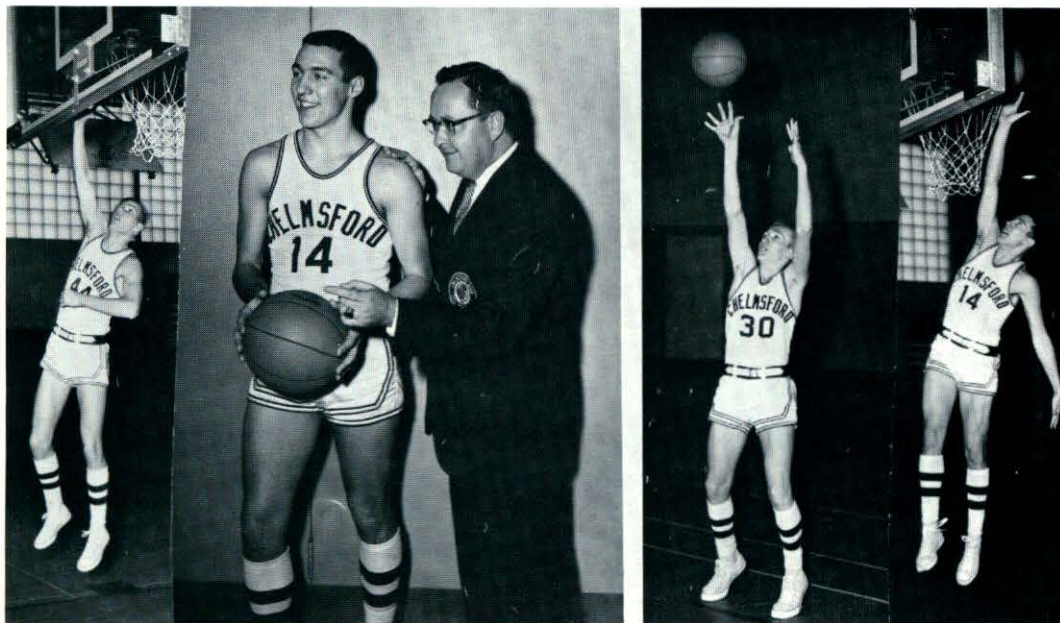
Coach Henry McCarthy and the team are to be commended and congratulated for a fine season, and for their excellent teamwork and sportsmanship.

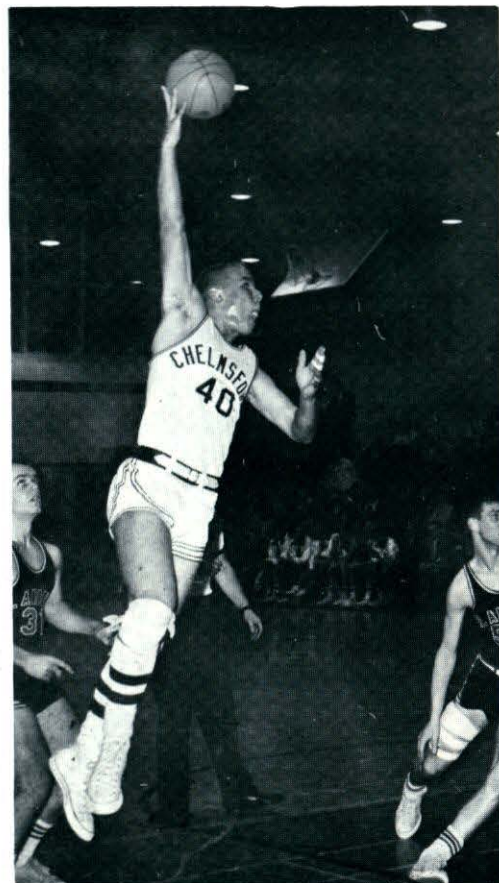
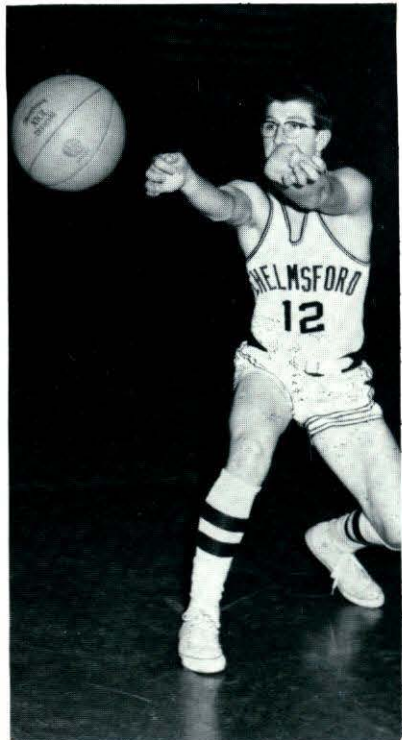
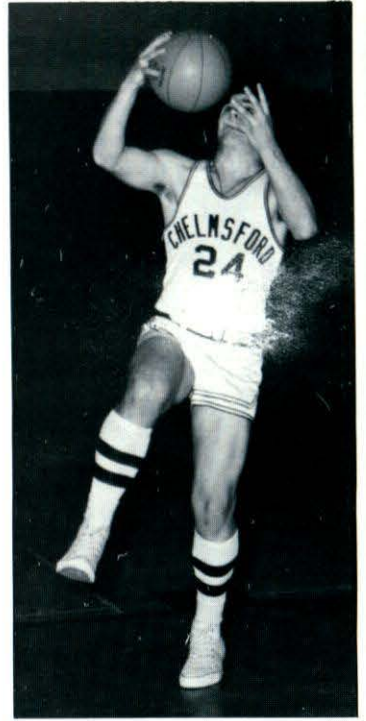
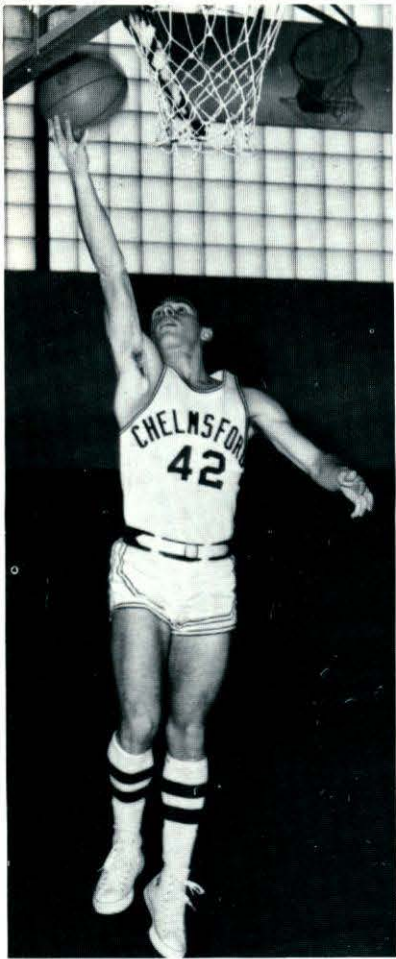
For the third consecutive year, Chelmsford High was the Lowell Suburban track champion, Chelmsford boys set records in every event except the discus and shotput.

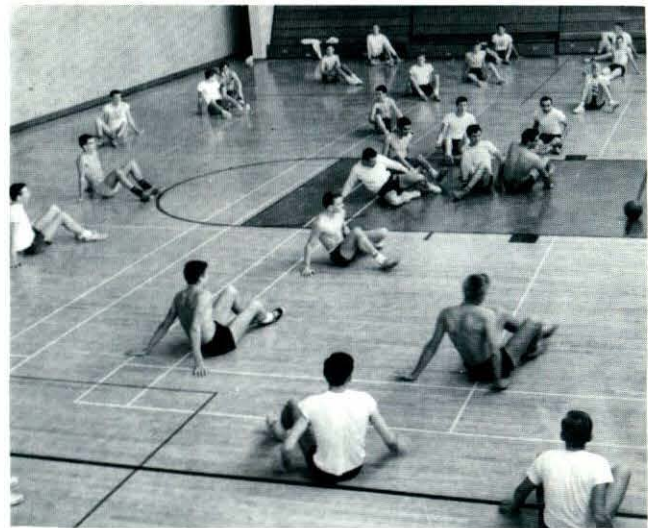
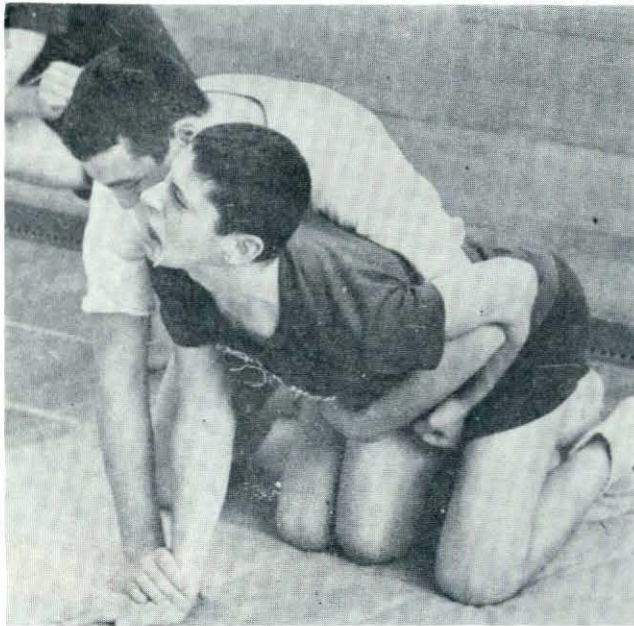
With many new faces along with a few old, the Lion track team is looking forward to its fourth consecutive Lowell Suburban Championship and another successful State meet.
