Key Club

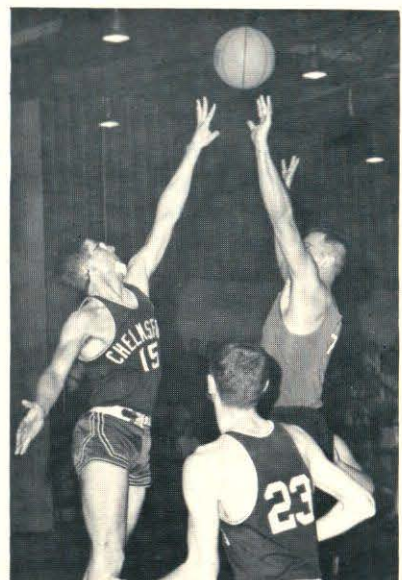

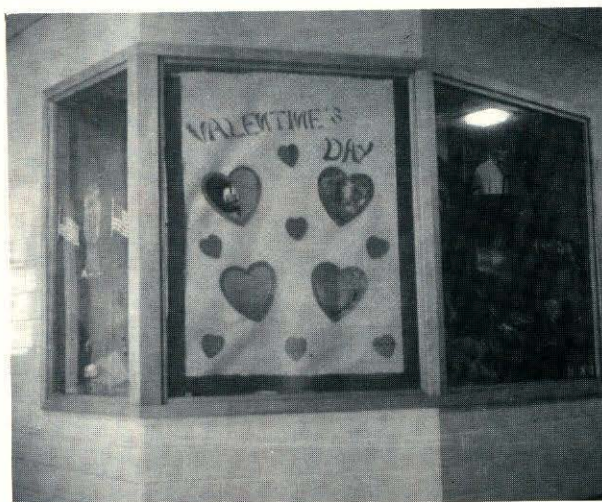
School Store

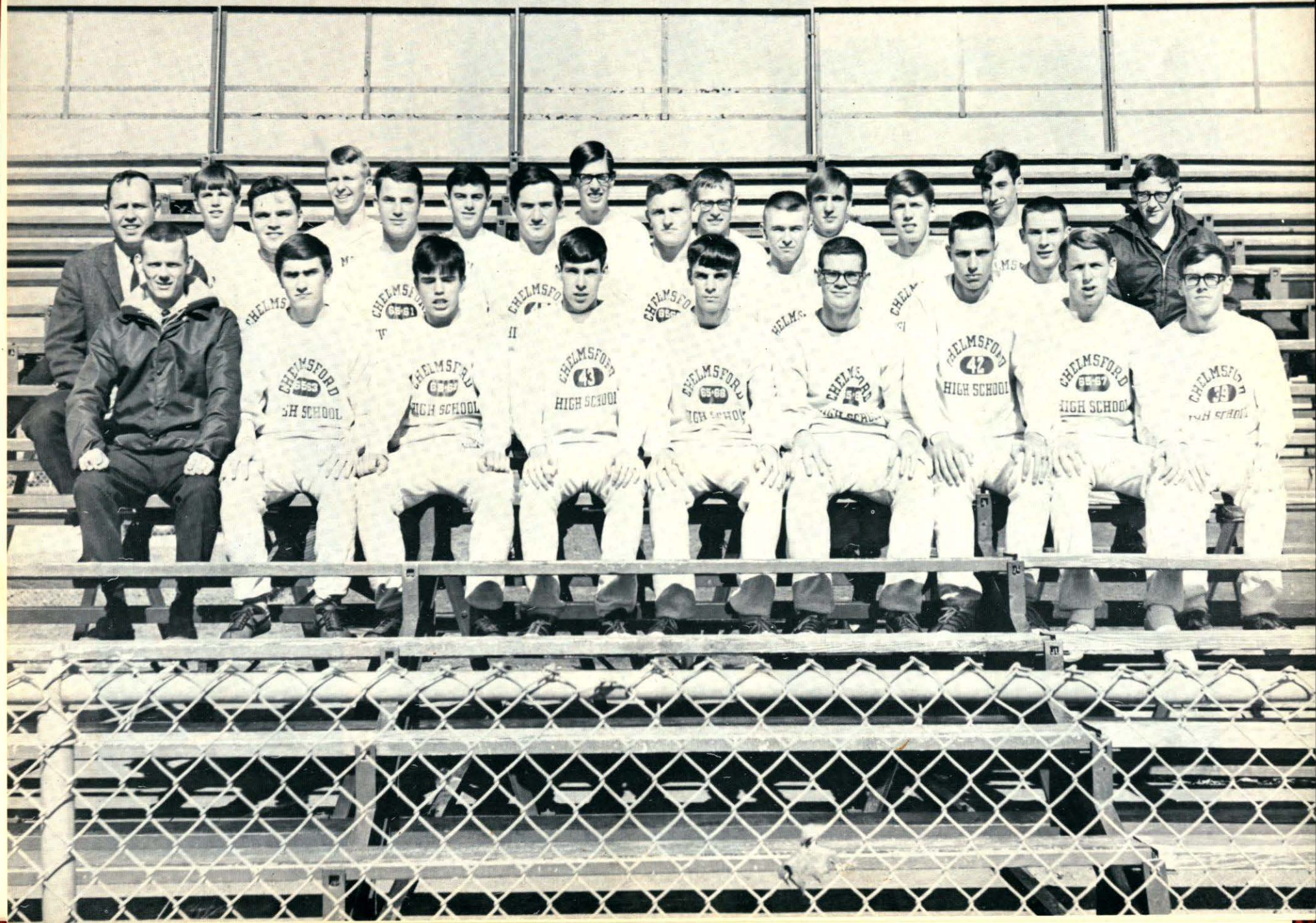


Track

As for Spring Track, the C.H.S. team finished second last year. This season they have a good chance of winning the conference. The best of luck to Coach Ed Quinn and his team.





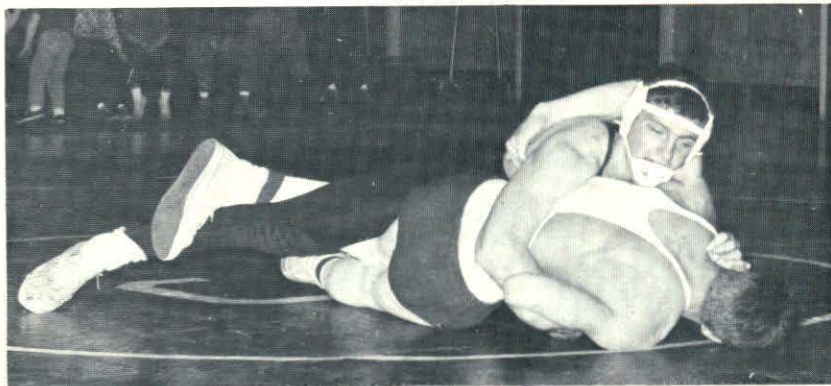
