



The five Parker brothers; - Abraham, James, Jacob, Joseph and John, - came from Wiltshire County, England to America about 1635 and settled first in Charlestown, and from there went to Woburn - Abraham 1641, John 1649 and James 1640 and later they all came to Chelmsford.

In the year 1652, the five brothers were members of a band of twenty men comprised of settlers from Woburn & Concord, who petitioned the Court, for the privilege to examine the land lying on the West side of the Concord river with a view of settling there.

The following year this party was joined by nine others and were granted by the Court a tract of land six miles square being in the form of an oblong. Capt. Willard of Concord and Capt. Johnson of Woburn were appointed to lay out the bounds of the township.

The Town of Chelmsford derived its name from the town in Essex County in England bearing the same name, situated on the River Chelmers.

# Abraham Parker

Taken from "The News" Woburn Feb 28, Mar 7, Mar 14, 1891

One of founders of Woburn - March 17, 1648 granted land.

Died in Chelmsford Aug 12, 1685

Wife Rose Parker had 4 children - Hannah, John, Abraham (died young),  
Abraham Jr - all born in Woburn.

Supposed to be buried in Chelmsford, but no stone found.

Grandson, Joseph, died 1738 oldest Parker memorial found in  
Chelmsford Cemetery.

1652 - 20 persons from Woburn + Concord petitioned the General Court  
for liberty to examine a tract of land lying West of Concord River  
with view to settlement. This was granted and a second petition  
was made to "lay out" 6 miles square of upland and meadow.

Abraham Parker was the first settler in Chelmsford.

The Town was laid out by Parker's friend and neighbor, Capt Edward  
Johnson of Woburn and Capt. Willard of Concord.

- Was received into the church at Chelmsford with wife Rose Sept 13, 1655.
- He was man of wealth + influence (Allen's History)
- He died in Chelmsford Aug 12, 1685 (The News - Mar 14, 1891)
- He and his son Moses were detailed "in garrison" with Rev Mr Clarke
- His nephew Thomas (son of Jacob) was granted 6 acres of land on  
condition that he set up his trade of shoe making.

Mar 14, 1891 "The News"

- His Will is probated in Suffolk Co, Registry of Probate in which he made  
bequeaths to his wife Rose, the sole executor, also to his daughter,  
Elizabeth Lydiah (wife of Jno Kidder)
- James Parker Jr Executive of Rose Parker's will was killed by  
the Indians in 1694.
- To John, Moses, Abraham, Isaac and Mary, he gave land.  
Deeds to the last three have not been found.

From Allen's History of Chelmsford p 22

1678 John Parker, son of Abraham built a saw mill on Beaver Brook - of which some remains were to be seen in 1820. This mill stood on Abraham's land. John paid for 1/3 of the cost of building it.

Allen says - The remains of the Upper Dam are still to be seen on the borders of the stream where it flows into the Lower Pond was once the "sufficient timber yard" spoken of in a deed.

At the Lower Dam there is still a Mill with a run of stones for grinding corn

1679 Abraham Sr was appointed one of 6 Tithingmen. Each Tithingman had 10 families, including his own, to look after. Hence Tithing or Tenthman.

His homestead was on the South side of Billerica Rd near the present Town Farm.

From Deeds in the Parker house

On the twenty first day of March 1731, Benjamin and his wife, Sarah, owing to the love they bore their son, Benjamin, conveyed to him, one half of all the lands and meadows belonging to said Benjamin & wife, situated as follows: Three lots lying in the Neck Field. The Neck Field included all the Indian lands lying North East of Chelmsford line & between the Concord & Merrimack Rivers; also four lots lying without the Neck Field fence, also one half the lands lying in Concord River Neck, "Concord River Neck lay between the Concord River & River Meadow Brook & extended south west to the line between Chelmsford & the Indian Plantation

Fourth two acres of meadow lying on the East side of River Meadow Brook.  
Fifth one half of a lot of land situated on the southerly side of the Great Swamp by the long causeway.

With all the buildings & fenceings standing on or enclosing any of said lands.

Furthermore two hundred acres of land & meadow in the County of Worcester. Said land was bequeathed to Sarah by her grandfather, Major Simon Willard

The other half of the property was given to Benjamin's brother, Jonathan. There were numerous restrictions;

First, the father & mother were to have free use of the dwelling house, the yard before the door & the yard back of the house, and the little orchard at Robbins' Hill for the remainder of their lives.

Second Two Cows & one horse for the parents' use.

Third Everything necessary for the maintenance of the parents, either in health or in sickness, was to be provided.

Fourth If the <sup>parents</sup> were not satisfied with the maintenance they received, one half of the property could be taken back, but in that case the parents would receive no help from the boys until the property was surrendered again.

Fifth The Parents were to have decent burial at their decease and after that the boys were to pay to each of their sisters, Mary Eaton ten lbs, Rebecca Proctor ten lbs, Tabitha Warren ten lbs, & to their cousin Sarah Barrett five lbs.

Benjamin Butterfield's appointment as Assistant Justice was from the State of New York. Capt. Butterfield led the Guard that conducted the prisoners to the Northampton, Mass., jail for trial.

## From Deeds in the Parker house

On the twenty first day of March 1731, Benjamin and his wife, Sarah, owing to the love they bore their son, Benjamin, conveyed to him, one half of all the lands and meadows belonging to said Benjamin & wife, situated as follows: Three lots lying in the Neck Field. "The Neck Field included all the Indian lands lying North East of the Chelmsford line & between the Concord & Merrimack Rivers," also four lots lying without the Neck Field fence, one half the lands lying in Concord River Neck; "Concord River Neck lay between the Concord River and River Meadow Brook & extended southwest to the line between Chelmsford & the Indian Plantation," fourth two acres of meadow lying on the East side of River Meadow Brook, fifth one half of a lot of land situated on the southerly side of the Great Swamp by the long <sup>(present plainst)</sup> causeway, with all the buildings & fencings standing on or enclosing any of the said lands. Furthermore two hundred acres of land & meadow in the County of Worcester. Said land was bequeathed to Sarah Parker by her grandfather, Major Simon Willard.

The other half of the property was given to Benjamin's brother, Jonathan Parker. There were numerous restrictions. First the father & mother were to have free use of the dwelling house, the yard before the door & the yard back of the house and the little orchard at Robbins Hill, for the remainder of their lives. Second Two Cows & one horse for the parents use. Third. Everything necessary for the maintenance of the parents either in health or in sickness, was to be provided. Fourth If the parents were not satisfied with the maintenance they received, one half part of the property could be taken back, but in that case the parents would receive no help from the boys, until the property was surrounded again. Fifth The Parents were to have decent burial at their decease & after that the boys were to pay to each of their sisters - Mary Eaton ten lbs, Rebecca Proctor ten lbs, & Abitha Warren ten lbs & to their cousin, Sarah Barrett five lbs.

### 3rd Generation

Lt Benjamin, son of Benjamin & Sarah Parker was appointed by Gov William Shirley of Boston in 1754 to be second lieutenant of the fourth foot company of Chelmsford of which Ebenezer Parker was captain. Benjamin & twenty three other Chelmsford men marched to Acadia, & aided in destruction of that settlement. Seventeen Acadians were meted out to Chelmsford to support.

Lt Benjamin also served in 1724 in the snow shoe company from Chelmsford during the fourth Indian War. The company was commanded by Capt. Robert Richardson & Lieut. Joseph Parker.

Lt Benjamin being one of the leading men of the times had an elaborate funeral. There are several bills for funeral equipage which cannot be assigned. They may have been Benjamin's or some of his family who died before him, but the bills for Lieut Benjamin are as follows: May 23, 1771

To 15 prs mens gloves

" 2 " mens black ditto

" 19 " woms ditto

" 3 " woms black ditto

" 3 Black handkerchiefs

" 3 Vails

" 1 Yd black ribbon

" 1 Black fan

" 3 Yds hat band crape

Due Sampson Stoddard, dealer, obtained through William Peirce for the funeral of Lieut Benjamin Parker.

Lt Benjamin's Body was borne over the long winding road to the burial ground at the center of the town, four miles away, by a relay of six men. There was an entry in the account for "rum & shoer" amounting to two shillings & one pence. Three physicians were paid for attendance upon him.

- Dr Kittredge 39 + (of Tewksbury)

Dr Oliver Prescott 5-14-0 (noted physician from Groton)

Nehemiah Abbot 46 + 8" (of Chelmsford)

The cost of the coffin 5 shillings & 4 pence (0-5-4) paid to Moses Davis, who kept a tavern at what is known as Davis' Corner.

The funeral was among the last of its kind in Chelmsford, for the Continental Congress at Philadelphia in 1774 passed an act forbidding the giving of gloves & scarfs at funerals and limited the mourning to a ribbon on the arm or necklace for the women. This was done to show resentment to Great Britain from whence the mourning was received.

The list of personal effects left by Lieut Parker remind us of the great changes that have taken place in dress and domestic economy.

Many of the articles are now found only in garrets or antiquarian collections. Among them were a blue coat + tucket, leather breeches, shoe buckles, knee buckles, warming pan, brass skillets, trammels, pillion, Riddle, sword + belt, Camblet coat + Green jacket, silver buttons" and two wheels. With these "wheels" the women of the household took their daily "spin" undisturbed by any fears of also taking a "header". One was a wool and one a flax wheel.

In the estate of the daughter, Sarah, we find such articles as a "Ridingwood (sic) caps, ruffles, ribbons, necklace, gloves, fans, stays, side saddle + bridle + pillion."

After Benjamin's death, Benjamin Jr was chosen by Samuel Danforth of the Court, to be the administrator of his father's estate. In his statement, his father's personal property amounted to two hundred twenty three lbs, sixteen shillings, eight + one half pence.

On June 2, 1772, Benjamin Jr, the administrator, submitted his account showing his expenditures to be 52 lbs, 2 shillings, 7/4 pence. To his brothers & sisters - "Philip, David Parker, Elizabeth Fletcher, Ruth Rogers, Mary Spaulding," the sum of ten lbs was paid to each.

Dec 1765 Elizabeth's funeral bill amounted to 30 lbs, 9 pence.

April 27, 1775, he enlisted in Capt John Ford's Company, Col Ebenezer Bridges' regt as a private, serving 3 months + 12 days. His company returned to Chelmsford Sept 25, 1775. In a descriptive list, dated June 15, 1775, his age is given as 22 yrs, stature 6 ft, complexion dark, occupation farmer. Capt Ford's Co of 60 men were with Gen. Artemus Ward at Cambridge but Ford received permission to march to the relief of his countrymen at Charleston. Upon arriving at the foot of the hill, the company was met by Gen. Putnam, who ordered them to man the cannon entrenched at the foot of the hill. Although they knew nothing about artillery, they had to accept.

# 4<sup>th</sup> Generation

Benjamin Jr had a very eventful life. Oct 28, 1765 He was Constable of the Town of Chelmsford. There is a paper in the Parker house made out by Harrison Gray, Treasurer and Receiver General for his Majesty's province in New England ordering Benjamin Parker, Constable of Chelmsford to collect the taxes etc, amounting to 133 lbs, 14 shillings + 8 pence. The following year, May 27, 1766 Benjamin sent to Boston 78 lbs 14 shillings + 10 pence. Jan 16, 1767, he sent the remainder.

In 1774, Benjamin Jr was made one of a party of fifteen to keep order in Chelmsford, as many of the citizens had become lawless. This time, he was appointed by the Chelmsford authorities, not by the King's officers.

When the alarm guns sounded on April 19, 1775, Benjamin repaired to Chelmsford Center, which was the meeting place for the militia and marched to Lexington, serving three days. About a week later, a new company was organized under Capt. Ford of Chelmsford + many of the men from Barron's company enlisted again and went to Cambridge. There is no record of Benjamin Jr enlisting in this company, although one of his sons did.

As Benjamin Jr was Town Clerk, there are several papers in the Parker house giving some of his transactions. Upon one paper he paid 366 lbs, 14 shillings 6 pence the mileage for thirteen soldiers from Chelmsford to North River  
" " " seven " " " " Rhode Island (Rhode Island)  
" " " two " " " " Winter Hill.

There are also two other accounts of money paid to soldiers.

In 1783, he was administrator of the estate of William Peirce of Chelmsford  
In 1789, " " " " " " " " William Blodgett of Westford.

In 1786, there is a statement as follows: To you gentlemen of Chelmsford upon the desire of Chelmsford, to lay out a bridle road, with a good gate, from the rode that comes from Chelmsford meeting house to Capt John Ford's, north of Micah Spaulding's barn, from the twenty feet wide rode about fifteen rods to my field. So I remain yours to serve, Benjamin Parker.

The following was dated Feb 27, 1787: "Mr Robert Young, Snr, these lines are to inform you that this receipt shall be your discharge for what is behind of what you have not got of that was due from Isaac Kent and this receipt shall be your discharge  
from me Benjamin Parker

There are also papers stating that Thorn Laydon had been hired by the Town Clerk for Chelmsford to serve 3 yrs in the Continental lines

Philip's + Benjamin's farms adjoined each other. Benj the father, previous to his death had deeded his dwelling house - the Easterly half to Benjamin, the Westerly half to Philip. The house at that time was undivided, but later the brothers divided it.
- May 20, 1791 - Benj having been loaned a sum of money by Jeduthan + Zebulon Parker compensated by giving  $\frac{2}{3}$  of all his lands lying in Chelmsford to his two sons. The remaining third, he reserved for himself, was to be near his dwelling house. He gave his sons the Easterly half of his dwelling, which half was to

May 30, 1791 Benjamin for 60 lbs lawful money pd to him by his sons, Jeduthan & Zebulon, bequeathed to his sons two thirds of all his neat stock; such as oxen, steers, cows & heifers, also one horse or horse kind, being of the feminine gender, it being the youngest of the two in his possession, only reserving for himself of the neat stock, one cow, called the Chamberlain cow, exclusive of the one third remaining.

July 5, 1799 Benjamin made a will, bequeathing his soul to God & his body to the earth. He requested first of all that his funeral expenses and his just debts, should be paid out of his estate by the executor.

1. To his wife Sarah (2<sup>nd</sup> wife), he bequeathed all of the household furniture that she brought to him at marriage. She was to choose two cows, two sheep & was to stay in his dwelling house three months after his death, if she desired. She was to have plenty of firewood and provisions, also seventy-six dollars & sixty-six cents, which was to be paid to her, one year after his death, by the executor of the estate.

2. Reuben Parker of Reading, Vt. was bequeathed thirty three dollars & thirty three cents to be paid one year after his father's death. This with what had previously been given him was his share. In 1787 Received nineteen shillings, fourpence & three farthings was his share of his mother's property.

3. Benjamin Parker of Keene, N.H. was bequeathed sixty dollars, his father's firearms, silver shoe buckles, knee buckles & stock buckles. This with what had previously been given him was his share. In 1787, Benjamin received his share of his mother's property, all sharing alike.

4. Joseph Parker was one of the executors of his father's estate. He was to pay all debts & was to receive all that remained of his father's property, both real & personal. The westerly half of the dwelling house in which his brothers owned the easterly half. Provision was also made that Joseph could not dispose of any of the real estate without first giving Jeduthan & Zebulon or their heirs a chance to buy the same.

5. Simon Parker was bequeathed fifty three dollars and thirty-three cents together with one fourth part of his father's husbandry & tools. This with what had previously been given him was his share. He also received his share of his mother's property.

7 Jeduthan received one fourth part of his father's husbandry & tools & one half of his father's carts & wheels. This with what had previously been given him was his share. He also received his share of his mother's property and was one of the executors of his father's estate.

The following account is one of Benjamin's records:

Wee the inhabitants of the Town of Chelmsford, taking into consideration the debilities and hardships which our Brethren indure and undergo that are in the Service of the United States of America and in the defence of the rights and privileges of the people of said States. Wee, being sensible that sundry articles being wanted by our Brethren which are in said service, especially shirts & shoes & stockings. Therefore, Wee the subscribers, the inhabitants of the Town of Chelmsford aforesaid, being willing to contribute something to their releaf by way of subscription.

Wee the subscribers do promise and engage each one for our selves to provide the article which we shall subscribe and specify at the end of our name, and also that wee will procure the said articles as soon as possible can be with any conveniency.

" The Receipt where of I do hereby acknowledge, do hereby give, grant, sell and convey unto the said Simon Parker Junr his heirs and assigns, the one undivided half of the following tracts of land, situate in said Chelmsford, first a tract of wood land containing seven acres + eighty seven cords (be the same or less) being the same that was conveyed to by Noah Spalding and Anna his wife by deed dated October 23<sup>d</sup> AD 1800 and recorded Book 141 Page 408 - Secondly the several pieces of land conveyed to me by Isaac Marshall <sup>deed</sup> dated Jan'y 18<sup>th</sup> AD 1790, Recorded Book 141 - Page 405 - thirdly a tract of land conveyed to me by Peter Marshall be deed dated June 16<sup>th</sup> AD 1804 - Recorded Book 168 Page 37 - fourthly a tract of land conveyed to me by Noah Spalding and his wife Anna by deed dated December 20<sup>th</sup> AD 1803, Recorded Book 168 Page 46 - fifthly a tract of land conveyed to me by Peter Marshall as administrator of the estate of Thomas Marshall, by deed dated June 18<sup>th</sup> AD 1801 Recorded Book Book 163. Page 220 - Also two tracts of land conveyed to me by Robert Brinley by deed dated April 21<sup>st</sup> AD 1820 - Also a tract of land conveyed to me by Benjamin Butterfield by deed dated April 15<sup>th</sup> AD 1897 - for a more particular description of the aforesaid tracts + the bounds thereof reference may be had to the aforesaid deeds - hereby intending to convey to the said Simon Parker Junr one undivided of all my lands in Chelmsford aforesaid and buildings thereon, however the same may be butted and bounded.

To Have and to Hold the aforegranted Premises to the said Simon Parker Junr and I do covenant with the said Simon Parker Junr they are free of all Incumbrances; That I have good Right to sell and convey the same to the said Simon Parker Junr

And that I will warrant and defend the same Premises to the said Simon Parker Junr his Heirs and Assigns forever, against the Claims and Demands of all Persons

"The Col. Joseph Moors Estate

An interesting Sketch of Family History a few weeks ago Mr Albert Moors, residing at No. 80 Moore street, appeared before the committee on streets with a numerously signed petition to have the name of the street changed to Moors, that being the spelling retained by the descendants of Col Joseph Moors, the first settler in that section, who gave the land for the street from Gorham street to the Concord river. The locality has a very interesting history dating back 165 years

Col Joseph Moors came to this section of the country from Cornhill London, in the year 1720 and settled in what was then the town of Chelmsford. He bought a tract of land from the Indians embracing about 500 acres and extending beyond what is now the Edson cemetery towards the south, reaching to the Concord river on the east, bounded on the west by Gorham street, then known as the Boston road, and taking in on the north part of the location now occupied by the Lowell Bleachery corporation. He was known as the largest landholder in the section and built a frame house near an old elm; probably planted by his own hand and still standing on land now in the possession of Mr Albert Moors, located on the southerly side of Moore street opposite his own residence. This house which he called the "Mansion" measured 20 x 40 feet and was two stories in height. It had port-holes on the south side as a precaution against Indian attacks and was quite a formidable building for the times. Miel one of the old settlers grandsons, in after years added an ell to the original house and the whole plant remained until a few years ago when the house was sold for less than \$100. to be torn down and removed. A National flag was raised over it at the breaking out of the rebellion and remained during the war. In it, four generations were born; Simeon the son; Miel, grandson; Simeon, great grandson; and Albert of the last generation, great-great-grandson and still living. In all the wills it was provided that any of the children who might be in need should always be cared for at the "Mansion". Col. Joseph Moors retained the whole property till his death and seems to have added to the estate by purchases made from time to time. He was buried in Chelmsford town, in the old church yard back of the

present Unitarian Church, where a slate tombstone now stands at his grave. His son, Simeon, and grandson, Niel, are buried by his side.

At the time of his death the property was left to his son, Simeon, and the greater part of it remained in the possession of the family until the time of Capt Simeon Moors, the great-grandson, who sold a large tract near the Concord river to the late Oliver M. Whipple about the year 1830, constituting nearly the whole of the Whipple estate. At the death of Capt. Simeon Moors in 1856 the remaining property included the fair grounds and vicinity, the old bathing mill site on Gorham street and other tracts. It was divided between Albert Moors, now residing on Moore street and his brother, Augustus P. Moors, who some years ago sold his portion lying on the Boston road and removed to Boston, of the original purchase only about three acres remain in the possession of the family - the lot now occupied by Albert Moors, No 80 Moore street, that of Lucius B. Moore, No. 73 Moore street and the spot where original mansion of Col. Joseph Moors stood. The first settlers gave the whole land from the old Boston road, now Gorham street, to the Concord river, for a public highway which is now called Moore street, though they always spelled their name Moors. The present stone two story house, No. 80 Moore street was built in 1840 by Capt Simeon Moors. The material was all taken from his own farm and he superintended the building himself, the work being all done by the day and in a manner to suit his ideas. The walls are eighteen inches thick at the first story and sixteen inches at the second story. All the rooms are finished 9 feet 6 in height and the hardware doors are 6 feet 9 inches high. Being over 5 1/2 feet in height himself and wearing a very tall hat he was unable to pass through the doors of the old mansion without uncovering his head or stooping, so he determined to have those of his new house high

enough to allow him to walk in and out in an upright manner. As before stated he died in 1856 and lies buried in the Lowell cemetery.

In 1821, he held two shares in the "Second Congregational Meeting House at Middlesex Village", some years ago removed to North Chelmsford and now a Catholic Church. Two certificates of stock in Mr Albert Moors's possession certify, under date of April 19, 1821, that Lieut Simeon Moors of Chelmsford is proprietor of two shares (Nos. 53 and 81) in the Second Congregational Meeting House in Chelmsford which shares are transferrable by assignment <sup>on the</sup> back hereof, the same to be entered on the records of the corporation. They are signed by Cyrus Baldwin, president, and Jesse Smith, clerk, and bear the seal of the corporation. Another paper held by Mr Moors is a "pew directory of the Second Congregational Church in Chelmsford". From this directory or plan it appears that the church had 52 pews and that Lieut Moors occupied No. 17. Among the other pew holders are found the names of O. M. Whipple, Jonathan Tyler, S. Kidder, Jonathan Bowers, A. Whitney, S. Adams, W. Adams, C. Baldwin and other familiar names in this section. The "Proprietors of the Glass Houses" had five pews reserved for their help.



- April 29, 1837 Benjamin + his brother Jephtha pd 1400 dollars to George Worcester of Amherst for land situated in Lowell containing 20 acres with the buildings thereon.
- Dec 18, 1837 Benj + Jephtha pd twenty one dollars, seventy five cents to Zebulon Parker of Bow, N.H. guardian of Bradley Parker for land in Chelmsford.
- Dec 6, 1841 Benj + Jephtha pd twenty two dollars to Zebulon + Philip Parker of Bow, N.H., Gilbert Parker of Westford, Obediah of Lowell, Nancy Varnum of Bracut, Hannah of Lowell + William Whittemore of N.H. in his wife's right. "The said grantors having received the land from their father, Zebulon Parker of Chelmsford" for a piece of land in Chelmsford.
- Oct 28, 1843 Benj + Jephtha pd 200 dollars to Samuel Winchester, guardian of Thebes E, Susan M., Sarah + Mary J Winchester "grandchildren of Jeduthan Parker of Chelmsford" from whom the land was inherited, for the following:
- 1<sup>st</sup> 50 acres of land with the buildings thereon situated in the Westerly part of Lowell
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> Two wood lots in Chelmsford containing 9 acres.
  - 3<sup>rd</sup> Three acres of woodland situated in Chelmsford near the half way house so called.
  - 4<sup>th</sup> One acre of meadow situated in Chelmsford on River Meadow Brook.
- Mar 27, 1844 Benj + Jephtha pd 200 dollars to their sister, Sarah, for her portion of their father's estate, part in Chelmsford + part in Lowell.
- Nov 26, 1849 Benj + Jephtha pd Nancy Ann Varnum 1000 dollars "said Ann being the daughter of Zebulon + Molly Parker of Chelmsford," from whom the land was obtained, for two pieces of land situated in Lowell:
- 1<sup>st</sup> a piece of land known as the Calf Pasture containing 1 acre 57 sq rds.
  - 2<sup>nd</sup> " " " " " " " " Old " " " 2 acres 6 sq rds.
- April 3, 1849 Benj + Jephtha pd 1000 dollars to Hannah J Loker, daughter of Zebulon + Molly Parker for a piece of land known as the Pierce Orchard containing 148 sq rds situated on the Southerly side of Liberty St.
- Feb 8, 1851 Benj + Jephtha + Benj F. Foster agreed to build + maintain a fence between their lands. The Parker brothers to build fence beginning at Liberty St + running Northerly 40 1/2 ft to the stake + stones from which Foster was to build Northerly 40 1/2 ft to the corner of a wall.
- Apr 1, 1853 Benj + Jephtha pd 15 dollars 20 cents to Smith Adams for a parcel of land situated in the Westerly part of Lowell containing 18266 sq ft.
- After the death of Benjamin in 1856, his wife was appointed administrator of the estate + guardian of the four children. The estate was undivided, Benj + Jephtha having owned everything in common. The undivided property was:

April 15, 1856 The Judge of the Probate Court ordered Eliza Parker, administratrix to sell at public auction all personal property of which no disposition had already been made.

May 20, 1856 The Probate Court authorized Holland Streeter, Henry Coburn + Smith Adams to make partition of the land formerly owned by Benjamin + his brother, Jephtha, giving half to Jephtha + half to Benjamin's heirs. The half set off as belonging to Benjamin's heirs was as follows:

1<sup>st</sup> a parcel of land with buildings thereon containing five acres +  $\frac{77}{100}$  situated on Liberty, Wilder + Westford Sts in the Westerly part of Lowell.

2<sup>nd</sup> a lot of land being being orchard, pasture + woodland situated near the first piece, being south of Liberty St (now Pine St) + containing 12 acres +  $\frac{29}{100}$  acres.

3<sup>rd</sup> a tract of woodland situated in the Easterly part of Chelmsford in Great Swamp so called or Tadnuck Swamp containing eight acres.

Out of this half, Eliza received as her dower the following parcels: -

1<sup>st</sup> a parcel of land, containing 2 acres +  $\frac{9}{10}$  more or less with the Westerly part of the dwelling house, the barn + other buildings thereon. The main entry, doorway,

cellar stairs, chamber & well to be used in common by the widow & heirs so far as should be needful for the convenient occupation.

2<sup>nd</sup> a parcel of land containing between 2 + 3 acres situated near the above mentioned piece on the Southerly side of Liberty St, called the Old Orchard & having a stone wall on all sides.

3<sup>rd</sup> A parcel of woodland lying in Great Swamps so called in the Easterly part of Chelmsford containing 2 acres more or less.

The account handed in by the administratrix Sept 1, 1857 valued the estate of her late husband "after the division" with the addition of the household furnishings as - personal property \$2669.81 real estate \$7264.61

At the expiration of Eliza's administration, after paying all debts, which amounted to \$991.81 + deducting the amount of personal property sold at auction amounted to \$63.44 there remained to be divided \$1141.56. Out of this remainder Eliza kept one third. This together with the \$500 which had been awarded by the court at the time of her husband's death was her portion. The remaining two thirds was equally divided among the 4 children.

Aug 24, 1858 The Probate Court authorized Holland Streeter, Henry Coburn & Smith Adams to divide the land set off as Benjamin Parker's share or half equally among the four children: -

1<sup>st</sup> Mary E. Foote received the easterly side of the dwelling house & 1/4 acres of land, adjoining her side of the dwelling.

2<sup>nd</sup> Benjamin F. Parker received a lot of land called the Young Orchard containing 2 acres 1322/600 rds. Also another piece called the Pierce Orchard south of Liberty St containing 1 acre + 98/100.

3<sup>rd</sup> To Henry E. Parker the lot called the Spring Pasture & four side orchard, situated south of Benj. F. Parker's land containing 5 acres 3/100.

4<sup>th</sup> To Phebe R. Parker a lot of land between Liberty & Westford Sts west of Wilder, containing 1 7/8 acres, also a piece of woodland situated in Chelmsford containing 6 acres.

As Phebe's share was of less value than her brother's share an agreement was made by which Benj F paid his sister Phebe eighty two dollars +

Nov 20, 1869 Henry pd \$500. to his brother, Benj. F. for a piece of land containing 2 acres 136 $\frac{1}{6}$  sq rods called the Young Orchard, being a portion of his father's estate.

Nov 23, 1869 Henry bought several pieces of land formerly belonging to his father's estate & given to Benj F., Phebe R., Mary E. Foote & Henry E. by their mother, Eliza

1<sup>st</sup> a parcel of land containing 2 acres  $\frac{7}{10}$  with the westerly part of the dwelling house & the barn & other buildings thereon.

2<sup>nd</sup> a parcel of land situated south of the old road or Liberty St (now Pine) called the Old Orchard containing between 2 + 3 acres

3<sup>rd</sup> a piece of woodland situated in the easterly part of Chelmsford, containing 2 acres. Said property having been set off as Eliza's dower.

Sept 22, 1873 Henry bought of Samuel G. Parker of Nashua & George W. Young of Lowell, a strip of land containing 14,190 sq ft lying South of Pine St & West of Stevens St.

Oct 28, 1873 Henry bought another piece from the same parties & the same locality, containing 4182 sq ft.

Apr 13, 1882 Henry pd \$100. to Daniel Caverly for a narrow strip of land adjoining his property, situated East of Stevens St containing  $984\frac{26}{100}$  sq ft.

After he became sick, Henry sold land as opportunity offered until at his death, there remained only about 9 acres in his possession.

Henry used to raise popcorn & sell it to a Mr. Forye who used to sell popcorn on the trains going from Boston to Concord, N.H.

He used to raise yellow eyed beans & traded them for pea beans with a Mr. Churchill who was a wholesale dealer in Lowell.

He raised potatoes and sold them to a Mr. Noyes, another wholesale dealer.
